All meetings begin at 5:00pm. Upcoming meeting dates include April 16, May 14 and June 4. The administrative team is working hard to evaluate resources and needs related to staffing, program development and academic department and grade level needs. We are currently reviewing our projected revenues and expenditures. Through March and April, the Board of Directors received presentations from our leadership team. We will finalize the budget over the next few months and will go before the public for a vote on June 4, 2024.

Missing a "few" might not seem like a big deal, but "a day here and a day there" can add up to a substantial amount of opportunity lost

| If a child misses                       | That equals       | Which is            | And over 13 years of school that's |

## BCRAC Arts in Education Programming

Missoula Children's Theatre (MCT) is a week-long residency program wherein students in grades K-12 learn theatre skills, audition for roles, rehearse, and perform in front of an audience at the end of the week. This past school year, Bradford County Regional Arts Council supported three Missoula Children's Theatre residencies at various locations throughout the county. In the fall, the Troy Area School District and the Sayre Theatre both hosted MCT for "Betty Lou and the Country Beast". Roughly 20 students participated in the residency in Troy and 35 at the Sayre Theatre. The Keystone Theatre in Towanda hosted MCT for "Blackbeard and the Pirate" in February. Forty-five students participated in this residency. In all, 100 students were able to participate in these professionally-led theatre experiences. It is our hope to continue to grow this program
