## Final Exam Information

GCCC will hold senior final exams on May 7th and 8th, and junior final exams May 20th and 21st. Students will follow a modified schedule on both days that includes exam periods, review time, and lunch. Please find important information for families below:

- Students MAY, at their teacher's discretion, be exempt from a final - please communicate with teachers if you have questions.
- Students with testing accommodations will receive extended time and support based on their IEP or 504 plan.
- Once students arrive on campus for the day, they are expected to stay until all testing is completed for the day. There is no "come and go" policy between exams.
- If a student only has a later afternoon exam, they may arrive at the start of that testing period.
- Students who finish an exam early must remain in the classroom until the scheduled transition time.
- Students needing to make up an exam must have a doctor's note or administrator approval.
- Students who plan to drive themselves do not need a permission slip to leave after they have completed their exams.
- Lunch will run in two sessions (Lunch A and Lunch B); students will be supervised in the Multipurpose Room when not eating.
- A full guidance document will be shared with students and families at a later date.
