Two Renewal Levies on March 2020 Ballot

Logan Elm Local School District will ask voters to renew two levies in the upcoming March 17, 2020 election. The levies make up 16% of the District's operating revenue. They pay for ongoing costs such as teacher salaries, utilities, upkeep of school facilities and bus transportation. Continuation of these levies is vital to fund our existing instructional and extracurricular programs. If the levies are not renewed before the end of 2020, the District will lose over \$3.4 million per year and will have to make significant budget cuts to make ends meet.

The two levies are not new taxes. The property tax originally passed in 1990 as an emergency levy to keep the district from an operating deficit. Since it was originally declared an emergency levy in 1990, we must continue to use the term "emergency" when renewing it. This levy has been renewed five times since 1990. The income tax originally passed in 2005. It is a 1.0% earned income tax; this means retirement income, interest income, rental income, dividends and capital gains are not subjected to this tax. This tax was first passed in 2005 and has been renewed two times.

Salt Creek Junior Naturalists Study the Cardinal, Our State Bird

During one of the final Junior Naturalists meetings before Winter break, students and advisers worked on creating ornaments and researching information on the state bird of Ohio, the Cardinal. Students were divided into three groups and each group was led by an adviser of the Junior Naturalists team. One group, led by Lorrie Huysman, worked on creating ornaments for their Christmas trees at home. Using items from nature, such as pine cones and branches, students were able to create their ornaments. Another group, led by Empress Bethel, focused on creating natural ornaments that could be displayed outside. Students used pine cones as the main



structure, while adding peanut butter and bird seed to complete the natural ornament. This ornament

provides food for the birds while maintaining an environmentally friendly design. (It should be noted that the advisers did check for any peanut butter allergies before beginning the activity and had told students that shortening could be used as a substitute.) The final group, led by Colleen Webb, researched various facts/information on the state bird of Ohio, the cardinal. The information found from the research has been put on display in the Salt Creek gymnasium on the Junior Naturalists board. As students completed each group, they would rotate until they had attended each of the three activities. The purpose of the activity was to focus on making environmentally conscious decisions (ex: glass bulbs in lieu of plastic, natural elements) even when celebrating the holidays.
