


McDowell Middle School holds "Tech Tuesdays"


Since it appears that digital learning will comprise much of our future classroom instruction, McDowell teachers will continue to improve their knowledge of digital education to better serve our students' needs.






LEHS Biology Students Get Creative

Winter Weather Tips from our Transportation Department:

- Students should dress according to the outdoor temperature and be sure to wear a coat, hat, and gloves. While our buses have heaters, students should be prepared in the event of a heater malfunction.
- Students should be ready for the bus a few minutes early and avoid running to the bus stop...snowy and icy patches could cause a fall!
- Students should stay back a few feet from the bus stop in case the bus should encounter difficulty in stopping.
- As they board the bus, students should use the handrail as the bus steps could be wet and slippery.
- On days with winter weather conditions, the bus may be running a few minutes late as our drivers will be driving cautiously to ensure everyone gets to school safely.

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
