STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math) is a new class for our K-5 students. In this class students practice soft skills like working in groups, sharing, and problem solving. They have used these skill sets to build various structures and mazes using Legos, Plus-Plus blocks, and planks. Third graders finished a whole unit on bridges while other classes looked at strength, height, and length. All classes have been working on their technology skills as well.

K-5 students have been working on a coding/robotics unit. Kindergarten started with putting together puzzles since they use Huey robots to code pathways for their robots to travel. First, second and third graders have been using Sphero Indi robots to practice their coding skills. Fourth and fifth graders took on the responsibility of testing all robots and evaluating their capabilities for the lower grades. Fourth graders also took on the task of making robotic hands using everyday materials. Fifth graders will be making bristle bots in the upcoming month.

Future projects include a school wide flight unit with each grade level focusing on a specific topic.
