

REPORT FROM OUR TREASURER





At their December meeting, the Logan Elm Board of Education acted to place two renewal levies on the May 6, 2025 ballot. **These renewal levies are not new taxes, and would not increase taxes.** They would simply maintain the tax rates that district residents have been paying for years to support our schools.

The first levy is an emergency property tax levy that generates \$812,000 in annual operating revenue. For a \$200,000 home, this costs the owner \$94 per year. The second levy is a 1% earned income tax paid by residents. An earned income tax only applies to employee compensation (wages, salaries, tips) and self-employment income. It does not tax retirement and investment income.

Both levies fund day-to-day operating expenses, so the need for them continues. According to the Board of Education's financial forecast, the district will run out of funds by 2029 if these levies are not renewed. Significant cuts would be made to avoid a deficit, eliminating essential services for students.

LOGAN ELM 2024-2025 Projects

Logan Elm Local School District is excited to update the public on current projects aimed at improving our facilities.



FIELDS PROJECT

As part of a multi-phase development, the district is currently constructing new middle school baseball and softball fields, which are set to open in the spring of 2025. These fields will provide much-needed practice and game space for student-athletes, offering the middle school baseball team a dedicated facility on campus for both practices and games, eliminating the need to use off-campus venues. In addition to the sports fields, improvements will also be made to the band practice area, enhancing the environment to better accommodate the needs of the Logan Elm Marching Band of Pride and support the growth of their award-winning program. The new fields will feature an irrigation system for optimal field conditions and a removable outfield fence, ensuring cost-effective, reliable playing surfaces for the student-athletes.

GREENHOUSE PROJECT-

Logan Elm is in the process of constructing a new 24x48 foot greenhouse on campus. This facility will serve as a hands-on learning environment for our Agriculture students, allowing them to study the growth of various vegetables and plants. Students will also have the opportunity to sell these plants within the local community. The greenhouse foundation is currently being established with concrete, and the project is expected to be completed by the end of February 2025.



ROOFING PROJECT-

During the summer, Damschroder Roofing and Logan Elm collaborated to enhance campus facilities. They installed new insulation and a PVC roof membrane on the McDowell building, improving the condition of its 25-year-old roof. Currently, McDowell serves as a space for offices, athletics, and auxiliary programs. In the future, it could also accommodate classrooms if the district experiences increased enrollment.



Logan Elm Elementary Recycles



As part of Logan Elm's ongoing efforts to promote sustainability, our Elementary School has a new recycling initiative, which was developed by students. This student-driven plan aims to encourage responsible waste management and foster a culture of recycling within our school community.

Partners in Promoting Recycling-PRHF Solid Waste has been an invaluable partner in helping to manage and promote the recycling program. They provide resources to Logan Elm, and even had their mascot, Rossco the Raccoon, come visit 5th graders.

This new recycling initiative is just the beginning of a larger commitment to sustainability at Logan Elm Schools. We are so proud of the collaborative efforts that are helping to build a more environmentally conscious generation.







Student Plan-

Every Wednesday and Friday, teachers will place recycling bins outside their classrooms. During 5th grade lunch, from 11:40 AM to 12:10 PM, 5th grade students will collect these recyclables and deposit them into a rolling can.

STUDENT PROBLEM-SOLVING-

Students are actively problem-solving by sharing their concerns on the whiteboard. Students write down what went well and what needs improvement.

STAFF PLAN-

Staff members Lyndi Ross, Susan Love, and Empress Bethel led the development of the program. With the support of the Logan Elm Education Foundation (LEEF), a professional development session was held in August, which gave the team the tools and resources needed to design a plan. During this session, Mrs. Ross suggested an inspiring connection to the United Nations' Global Goal #12-"Responsible Consumption and Production." This idea was a perfect way to highlight the global impact of responsible recycling.
