Preschool Promise Career Pathways Program – Malori Feltman, Pathways Assistant

James Cosby who has been running the program is leaving PP for an exciting venture. With his departure, Malori is the point of contact for the Promise Scholars program. Preschool Promise is making changes to the program due to a lack of funding to continue the way things have been.

Malori will be sending MOUs which will note new requirements. It used to be that teachers had to work 20 hours/month to be eligible, and now it is 20 hours/week.

We are still funding CDAs, and teachers already enrolled in an Associate's degree or Bachelor's degree program can continue where they started. However, teachers enrolling for the first time through the Promise Scholars program must enroll in the following schools in order for Preschool promise to pay the tuition:

- Associate's Degree Sinclair or University of Cincinnati.
- Bachelor's Degree University of Cincinnati, Wright State, and Central State

Also going forward, teachers should apply for the Promise Scholars program at <u>preschoolpromise.org/scholars</u>. A welcome email will be sent and include a description of the program. Malori asked Directors to share the application information with their teachers.

Questions:

- Is there any tutoring offered? Preschool Promise recommends teachers utilize the tutoring services the college provides. Cheryl is our retention specialist; she is there to help you navigate the university if you need assistance.
- If a teacher already has an Associate's degree, will she find out if she's eligible by going to the website? Going to the website and clicking on the Apply Now button will lead applicants to a few questions that will help them know if they are eligible.

Black Boy Brilliance – Christopher James, Senior Project Manager

This is an evidence-based program with the goal of improving learning environments for all students and uplifting Black boys.

Preschool Promise is hosting screenings of the Black Boys documentary. Future showings include 8/31, 9/12, 9/14, 9/30. <u>Here is a list</u> of all screenings where you can register to attend one. Preschool teachers and administrators at Preschool Promise sites will receive a \$100 stipend for attending.

The Black Boy Brilliance program is also about getting Black male mentors into preschool classrooms. Men who have a particular talent have developed activities for preschool classrooms. All the men who volunteer have gone through ODJFS background checks and been properly vetted to be in classrooms. Ohio Department of Job & Family Services Licensing Updates

ODJFS has a new childcare *newsletter*, volume 18 was sent out and is available online. (See attachment.) Check it for many resources for families. It includes an update about Read It Again, the new reading curriculum. Manuals have been shipped to FCC programs over the summer. Other programs will begin receiving them. If you don't know about Read It Again, <u>click here</u> for information.

Ohio Department of Higher Education has announced a new *college credit guarantee* for the CDA credential. People with CDAs can now obtain college credit toward an associate degree that prepares teachers to work in preschool settings. See the attachment for more information.

As of July 11, 2023, the <u>ODJFS web pages</u> have a new look. The goal is to improve your experience with better organized information and easier navigation. There are also new features to help you find what you need, including tiles that direct the user and search tools. If you previously bookmarked a page, the URL for that page may have changed and your bookmark may no longer work.

Family Child Care Start-Up Incentives were being offered through the calendar year. ODJFS has reached the goal of 100 new licensed family child care home providers who are able to provide publicly funded child care to Ohio's children.

ODJFS has a *Child Care Chatbot* called Charlie. The Chatbot, Charlie, can be located and accessed at the bottom right corner(s) of the Child Care Time, Attendance, and Payment (TAP) website at https://ohiocctap.info, the Ohio Child Licensing and Quality System (OCLQS) main website at oclqs.my.site.com, or from any program's dashboard in OCLQS.

Charlie has been tailored to help answer *general* questions that are normally handled by our Child Care Business Unit via telephone or email inquiry. If you encounter any issues with Charlie not loading the "Hello" message, you may need to clear your cookies and cache' and then try again. Additionally, if your organization uses a Virtual Private Network (VPN), you may need to disconnect from your VPN to get the Chatbot to load successfully and then you can reconnect to it after receiving the "Hello" message. Reach out to the Child Care Business Unit directly if Charlie doesn't have the answers you're looking for. Provider Access to Publicly Funded Child Care (PFCC) Application Status – ODJFS emailed guidance on April 5, about PFCC applications. It stated that ODJFS is able to provide the PFCC application status with your program when your program is listed on the PFCC application. The application statuses available through the Child Care Policy Help Desk include:

- Submitted/Pending
- Denied, not eligible for Payment After Denial (PAD)
- Approved, as well as denied but eligible for PAD application statuses are available in Kinder Connect.

Many providers have utilized this option. If you wish to receive application status information on more than two families, send an email to childcarepolicy@jfs.ohio.gov with the following:

- Your program's name
- Your program's license number
- Caretaker's Date of birth
- Caretaker's Last four digits of SSN
- Caretaker's Address
- Caretaker's Phone number

It may take up to 5 business days to receive a response via email regarding application status inquiries.

More information regarding additional efforts and time frames will be sent as they are being implemented. We will notify programs when these additional supports become available. Please contact the Child Care HelpDesk at 1-877-302-2347, option 4 if you have questions.

As of July 1, *copay waiver support* ended. PFCC should have started collecting copayments as of July 9. Currently assigned co-payment amounts can be viewed in KinderConnect for each child with an authorization to your program. Early Learning and Development Standards (ELDS) – We are excited to announce the first training in a series about the new Early Learning and Development Standards! The Early Learning and Development Standards Overview Training is free and Ohio Approved for two hours. It consists of online on-demand modules. Access the training by logging into the Ohio Professional Registry (OPR) and searching for Early Learning and Development Standards Overview Training or ST10129633.

Follow these Instructions for Accessing the Early Learning and Development Standards found on this page. Additional trainings about the standards by age group will be available soon for early care and education providers serving preschool age children, infants and toddlers, and mixed age groups. All standards trainings will be listed in the OPR, Ohio Approved, and free! There will be both in-person and online training options statewide. These training sessions can be used for SUTQ hours as well as licensing.

Every provider was sent a copy of the standards. Additional copies are available at in-person training through the local R&R and state support teams. Contact ELSR@education.ohio.gov for questions about the Early Learning and Development Standards.

PD Certificate for SUTQ – Our department sent the following communication only to programs that did not meet the professional development standard for the last biennium on or around Friday July 21st:

According to the trainings verified in the Ohio Professional Registry (OPR), you have at least one employee in a Step Up To Quality (SUTQ) role (Administrator, Lead Teacher, or Assistant Teacher) that requires a Professional Development (PD) Certificate who did not obtain their PD Certificate for the last biennium ending June 30, 2023. As a result, your program's SUTQ rating is in jeopardy of being removed. In order to maintain your SUTQ rating, the employee(s) who did not meet the PD Certificate requirement are required to obtain their PD Certificate for the current biennium by Sunday, October 29, 2023. Your first action should be to confirm all employees for your program are current employees and have the correct roles. If there are any employees linked to your program who are no longer employed, unlink them from your program. If the professional has multiple OPR profiles, that may also affect the PD Certificate and the OPR will need to be corrected.

COPAYMENT WAIVERS ENDING FOR PUBLICLY FUNDED CHILD CARE (PFCC)

The temporary copayment waiver support for families receiving PFCC will end July 1, 2023. PFCC providers must begin collecting the assigned copayments for the service week beginning July 2, 2023. Programs providing PFCC must make sure they have signed copayment agreements with their families receiving PFCC.

NEW EARLY LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS TRAINING

The Early Learning and Development Standards (ELDS) outline the essential domains of development and school readiness from infancy through the end of preschool. They describe what children need to learn and illustrate how skills may develop in the first five years of life. Early care and education providers across Ohio use the standards to guide curriculum selection and implementation. Programs participating in Step UpTo Quality (SUTQ) are required to have a copy of the ELDS available in each classroom (may be an electronic or printed copy).

The ELDS were recently revised by the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) and the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS). New training is available to support early care and education professionals who use the ELDS in their programming. The ELDS training is free and is Ohio Approved for two hours. The training is available in the **Ohio Professional Registry**. It consists of online on-demand modules. Search for Early Learning and Development Standards Overview Training or ST10129633. Instructions for Accessing the Early Learning and Development Standards are on this page.

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More ELDS trainings will be available. All ELDS trainings will be free, Ohio Approved, and listed in the Ohio Professional Registry. There will be in-person and online training options statewide.

The ODE and the ODJFS licensed sites serving infants, toddlers, or preschool children received one copy of the standards. Additional copies are available at no cost. They are available at in-person trainings through local Child Care Resource and Referral (CCR&R) agencies. They are also available through State Support Teams. If you did not receive a copy, please reach out to your State Support Team or CCR&R.

AUGUST 2 IS NATIONAL COLORING BOOK DAY

Coloring books help children develop fine motor skills. They also help children learn focus. Have children create their own classroom coloring books. Each child makes an outline drawing, and the teacher copies them to staple into books for the children to color in. Let them spend time coloring in their books and share their work with the class.

LEARNING ABOUT ANIMAL CLASSIFICATION – FROGS AND TOADS

Children love learning about the natural world around them. Learning about animals is interesting to children because of the way animals interact, eat, move, and communicate. Children are also budding scientists who like to learn facts about animals and how to group them by their similarities and differences.

You can help children understand how to classify animals by exploring similarities and differences between frogs and toads:

- Read books to the children about frogs and toads. Then create a Venn diagram with the similarities and differences.
- Play a recording of frog sounds and then play one with toad sounds. Ask children to imitate the sounds and to describe the differences.

- Consider taking a field trip to a nature center, zoo, or pet store to observe frogs and toads. If a field trip is not practical, have the children watch videos of frogs and toads. Then ask the children to draw pictures of each and describe the differences.
- Teach children about the habitats of frogs and toads. Then ask them to describe the similarities and differences.

Extension activities:

- Play leapfrog:
 - Show children what lily pads look like. Have kids cut large green circles out of construction paper. Let them cut out one small 'v' shape out of the side to make it look like a lily pad shape. Let them design a lily pad course on the floor. Then have the children jump from lily pad to lily pad. You can combine it with a game of 'Simon says.' Tell the children to jump or stop jumping, but only if you say "Simon says" first. The lily pads could also be outside on a sidewalk or drawn with green sidewalk chalk.
- Help the children make a Toad Abode: Toads are most active at night or on cloudy days. On sunny days they like to stay in burrows underground to stay moist and cool. The children can help make a cool, dark spot for a toad on a hot day by making a "toad abode," Ask for donations of small clay flower pots for the children to decorate. Have the children turn the pot upside down and decorate the outside with paint or markers. Let the children take home their pots. Let them know to prop up one side of the upside-down pot to make an opening for the toad to enter when they place it outside. PIETIME

Favorite summer desserts include fruit pies! Cherry pie, blackberry pie, and strawberry pie are a few of the favorites. Summer is a great time to include fun pie activities in your lesson plans.

Hands-on pie making:

- Take the children on a field trip to pick berries. If you cannot take a field trip you can use store bought berries. You can ask someone from your county extension office to come to your program. Ask them to talk about how berries grow. Here's a link with contact information for county extension offices: https://extension.osu.edu/ lao#county
- Have the children wash, dry, and remove any stems or leaves from the berries. Large berries, such as strawberries, may need to be cut into smaller pieces.
- Let the children work together to mix up ingredients for pie dough, then give each child a small amount of dough to roll out two circles of dough. Have them pat one circle into a mini pie pan.
- Have the children add the berries, sprinkle sugar on top, cover with the second circle of dough, pinch the edges together, and prick with a fork. Place the pies on a baking sheet that is covered with parchment paper. Write the children's names next to their pies and bake.

The children could also make homemade ice cream to eat with their pies. Here's a website with instructions for making ice cream in a bag: www.thebestideasforkids.com/icecream-in-a-bag/

Dramatic play, pie delivery:

- Give children pie pans and pictures of fruit to put in them.
- Have children take turns being pie bakers, pie sellers, pie deliverers, and pie buyers.
- Give the children play money and boxes to use as cash registers.
- Let the children make signs with the price of pies.
- If age appropriate, let them pay with the pretend money and make change.

Teach the children about graphs by making a pie graph about pies:

- Cut a large circle from a poster board.
- Cut the circle into as many pie pieces as there are children in the room.
- Have the children write their name on their pie slice.
- Ask the children what kind of fruit pie or plain fruit they like best. Have the children draw a picture of that fruit on the pie slice.
- Have them tape their pie slices back in the circle. Group fruit types together.

Practice letters and names by making shaving cream pies:

- Put shaving cream in a pie plate.
- Give the children spoons and let them stir washable paint into the shaving cream.
- Add scent to the shaving cream by sprinkling in some vanilla or cinnamon.
- Let them practice writing their names and letters in the shaving cream.

The PFCC co-payment waiver support will end on July 1, 2023. All families receiving PFCC will pay their assigned co-payments to their authorized provider(s) beginning the service week starting July 2, 2023. Talk to your provider to make sure you have a signed co-payment agreement.

Ohio Benefits Self-Service Portal (SSP)


The Ohio Benefits website (**benefits.ohio.gov**) has helpful step-by-step video instructions for navigating the SSP.

To see your PFCC copayment amount in the SSP:

- Hover over Access My Benefits and then click on "View My Benefits."
- Select the desired case and click "Save and Continue". You will be taken to the screen which provides benefit information for the case.
- In the child care section, you can see the weekly copayment amount.

EXPECTING A NEW BABY IN YOUR FAMILY?

A new baby means many changes for the whole family. Some tips to help you prepare your older children are:

- See if your hospital offers a sibling preparation class.
- Let your child know who will care for them when mom goes to the hospital.
- Read books about new babies.
- Show your child pictures from when they were a baby.
- Talk to your child about what will be different in your home when the new baby arrives.
- Talk to your child about ways they can help care for the baby. For example, they can hand you a new diaper or wipes at changing time.

WHAT IS SUMMER LEARNING SLIDE?

A Johns Hopkins study found that children can lose up to 2 months of what they learned during the school year. Help children use the skills they have learned in school during summer months. This can help stop the summer slide. Families can have fun with children while helping them exercise their minds.

Tips for combating summer learning slide:

- **Cooking together:** Cooking reinforces math and reading skills. Reading the recipe and following the directions together helps with reading skills. Measuring and mixing helps with math skills such as fractions, estimating, and planning.
- **Making a scrapbook:** Take pictures of fun summer activities the children take part in. Print the pictures and have the children tape them into a notebook. Help your children write sentences about the activities.
- **Playing games:** Children love to play games. A deck of cards will let you play many different card games with your kids and help their math skills. Games like 'Go fish' and 'Concentration' help with number recognition and prediction. Games like '31' and 'Hearts' help teach addition. The great thing about card games is you can modify them for different age and skill levels.

DANGERS OF BUTTON BATTERIES

Button cell batteries are flat, coin or button shaped batteries. They are found in many toys, remote controls, and other household items. Their small size makes them easy for children to swallow. Children may also be tempted to insert the batteries into noses or ears. These batteries cause serious internal damage and possible death when swallowed. Doctors warn families to keep these and all batteries away from children.

- Never leave batteries out.
- Keep remote controls out of the reach of children.
- Check items to make sure the battery compartments are securely fastened.
- Don't let children play with anything that has batteries that are easily accessed.
- If an item falls or is damaged, make sure the battery compartment is still securely fastened.
- Remind family members with hearing aids to keep their batteries and aids out of the reach of children.
- Immediately take your child to an emergency room if you think they swallowed a battery.

SUMMERTIME SAFETY TIPS

Summer is a great time for children to spend time playing outdoors. However, there's a higher risk of some injuries that happen in the summer, according to Children's Hospital of Richmond, Virginia. Below is a list of some safety tips to help keep kids safe during summer months:

- Children should wear sunscreen with a sun protection factor higher than 30. Make sure they wait 20 minutes after applying it before getting in the water.
- The American Academy of Pediatrics states that hats, sunglasses, shade, and appropriate clothing help protect children from too much sun.
- Avoid prolonged sun exposure from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm.
- Make sure children drink enough water. The American Academy of Pediatrics states:
 - Children ages 1-3 need approximately 4 cups of beverages per day, including milk and water.
 - Children ages 4-8 need approximately 5 cups per day.
 - Older children need approximately 7-8 cups per day.
 - Amounts should increase during times of heat and humidity.
 - Amounts should increase during high activity periods.

- Don't let children play with sparklers. Give them safe light up toys instead.
- Children should always wear appropriate helmets while riding bikes, scooters, and skateboards. Make sure the helmet fits correctly.
- Make sure children wear the correct size life jacket on boats and near open bodies of water.
- Don't let children use water wings or swim noodles instead of life jackets.
- An adult that can swim must watch children swimming at all times. The adult should not be distracted. Keep young children within arm's reach at all times.

Ohio Department of Higher Education Announces New College Credit Guarantee for the Child Development Associate (CDA) Credential

Industry Recognized Credential Transfer Assurance Guides (ITAGs)

ITAGs are a statewide transfer initiative that guarantees the award of college-level credit to students earning agreed-upon industry-recognized credentials, regardless of how they learned the skills required to pass the credentialing exam.

The ITAG policy, approved by Chancellor Randy Gardner in 2021, will create new opportunities for Ohioans seeking to further their education. Many of the ITAG agreements that have been created address the needs of Ohio's workforce and help build new onramps into higher education for Ohioans who have historically faced barriers. Creating new ITAGs brings both educators and industry to the table. Building upon the state's existing set of comprehensive transfer agreements, Ohio is well positioned to incorporate industry-recognized credentials into its nationally recognized structure.

Eligibility and Opportunities with the CDA ITAG

- Individuals who hold current CDA certificates issued by the Council for Professional Recognition are eligible for credit.
- Credit may be accessed at Ohio's public institutions of higher education.
- Applicable to associate degree programs that prepare teachers to work in preschool settings with children ages 3-5
- Students are guaranteed to receive credit for a minimum of two courses for their CDA.

Next Steps

Interested students should reach out to the school they plan to attend to discuss next steps. Students should be prepared to provide documentation of their current CDA certificate to receive credit. DATE:	May 30, 2023

On July 1, 2023, the publicly funded child care (PFCC) co-payment waiver support will end. All families receiving PFCC are required to begin paying their assigned co-payments to their authorized provider starting July 2, 2023.

All attendance for child care provided on or before July 1, 2023 must be entered in KinderSign before July 8, 2023 so your provider can submit to ODJFS. ODJFS will provide co-payment support for any attendance entered by the family and submitted by the provider on or before July 8, 2023.

All programs that provide PFCC have been notified the temporary waiver assistance will end and were instructed to begin collecting assigned co-payments. Talk to your provider to ensure you have signed a co-payment agreement.

Currently assigned weekly co-payment amounts are accessible to you in two different systems.



Publicly funded child care (PFCC) can only be provided by Step Up To Quality (SUTQ) rated programs, unless the program meets an exemption. If an exemption is not met, a program's "Provider Agreement for Publicly Funded Child Care Services" and any current PFCC authorizations may be terminated by the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS). If a program meets one of the exemptions listed below, this document will help determine when to register for SUTQ if there is a change in your exemption status.

The following programs are exempt and may provide PFCC without being SUTQ rated:

Group A

- All licensed type A and type B family child care (FCC) home providers
- An ODJFS licensed child care center program or Ohio Department of Education (ODE) licensed preschool or school-age program that provides PFCC services to less than 25% of the program's approved license capacity
- A program that operates only during the summer and not more than 15 consecutive weeks
- A program that operates only during school breaks
- A program that operates only on weekday evenings/overnights, weekends, or both

Group B

- A program that has a pending revocation action, but the license has not yet been revoked
- A program that is in provisional license status

Group C

• A program that had its SUTQ rating removed or reduced to zero by ODJFS within the previous 12 months (this does not include initial registrations)

Group A

The following programs are no longer required to participate in SUTQ to provide PFCC:

- Type A and type B FCC home providers
- ODJFS licensed child care centers and ODE licensed preschool and school-age programs that provide PFCC to less than 25% of the program's approved license capacity
- Programs that only operate during any one or more of the following time periods:
 - Summer only and for no more than 15 consecutive weeks
 - School breaks (fall/winter/spring breaks, school in-service days and holidays)
 - Non-traditional hours (7 pm 6 am weekdays and/or 12 am Saturday 6 am Monday)

These programs must self-declare their exemption status in OCLQS. If there is a change in programming, it is the provider's responsibility to log into OCLQS and remove the exemption information. Programs are encouraged to review and align their programming with the SUTQ standards prior to initial registration. Programs should submit an initial registration for SUTQ within 30 days of no longer meeting the exemption criteria to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

ODJFS records rating removal, provisional license status, and a pending revocation in OCLQS. Programs need to self-declare in OCLQS if they meet one of the remaining exemptions. Programs should mark "yes" to the corresponding question(s) as a method of communication to ODJFS that their program meets an exemption and can provide PFCC without being SUTQ rated.

- New programs, when applying for a program license, can answer these questions in the *"Program Details"* section.
- Currently licensed programs can respond to these questions in OCLQS by clicking *"Manage Programs"* on their license card, then click on the *"Update Program Information"* button and finally click the *"Update Facility Information"* button. Make sure to click submit to send the information.

Please reference the <u>SUTQ Provider Exemption Job Aid</u> for further instructions on documenting exemptions in OCLQS.

Examples:

A-1. An ODJFS licensed child care center and ODE licensed preschool and school-age programs need to monitor their enrollment to determine if their program meets the exemption. If the program provides PFCC to 25% or more of their licensed capacity, as displayed in OCLQS, the program must submit a registration and become SUTQ rated.

A-2. A program currently operates only during school breaks and holidays, such as Martin Luther King Day. The program is changing and will operate every weekday from September 20, 2023 – March 15, 2024. The program will need to report in OCLQS that they no longer meet an exemption within 30 days of the change. Additionally, the

program should submit an initial registration for SUTQ no later than October 20, 2023 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

A-3. A program currently operates from 8 pm – 5 am and these hours of operation have been reported in OCLQS. The program is changing August15, 2023 and will start operating 24 hours a day. The program will need to report in OCLQS that they no longer meet an exemption within 30 days of the change. Additionally, the program should submit an initial registration for SUTQ no later than September 14, 2023 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

Group B

When ODJFS proposes to revoke a program's license the program's rating is removed. However, the program is exempt from the requirement to be SUTQ rated and may provide PFCC during the revocation process. Programs are encouraged to continue aligning their programming with the SUTQ standards. If the program's license is not revoked, the program must submit a registration for SUTQ within 30 days of the end of the revocation process to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

Example:

B-1. ODJFS issues a proposed adjudication order (PAO) that notifies the program of ODJFS' intent to revoke the program's license. The program receives the notice on August 3, 2023. The final decision not to revoke the license is issued on November 20, 2023. The program will need to submit a registration for SUTQ no later than December 20, 2023 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

Programs in provisional license status are exempt and may provide PFCC services while operating under a provisional license. These programs can submit an initial registration for SUTQ anytime but should submit a registration **no later than 90 days before the end of their provisional period** to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services. The exemption period ends when the continuous license is issued. (The only exception is FCC programs that are not required to participate in SUTQ.)

Example:

B-2. A program's provisional period is January 6, 2023 – January 5, 2024. Unless the program meets another exemption listed, the program should submit an initial registration for SUTQ by October 7, 2023 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

Group C

Programs whose rating is **reduced to zero** due to a serious risk noncompliance (SRNC) or when the program accumulates 24 – 30 moderate and serious risk noncompliance points cannot be rated for 6 months from their reduction effective date per Ohio Administrative Code. However, per Ohio Revised Code, these programs are exempt and may provide PFCC for 12 months without being rated. Programs whose ratings are reduced to zero can submit a registration for SUTQ **60 days after the reduction effective date but no later than 90 days before their exemption ends** to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services. The expiration of the exemption is 12 months from the reduction date.

Example:

C-1. A program's rating is reduced to zero, effective October 6, 2022. The program cannot be rated for 6 months (until April 3, 2023). However, the program is exempt for 12 months and may provide PFCC until October 6, 2023. The program can submit a registration for SUTQ as early as December 5, 2023 but no later than July 8, 2023 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

Rating reduced (effective date)	October 6, 2022
Program cannot be rated for 6 months	April 3, 2023
Earliest the program can register (60 days after reduction effective date)	December 5, 2022
12-month exemption period	October 6, 2022 – October 6, 2023
Latest the program can register (90 days before exemption ends)	July 8, 2023

Programs whose ratings are **removed** due to a serious risk noncompliance (SRNC), or an accumulation of moderate and serious risk noncompliance points (30 or more) are exempt and may provide PFCC for 12 months without being rated. Programs whose ratings are removed may submit a registration for SUTQ **as soon as 180 days but no later than 90 days** before their exemption ends to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services. The expiration of the exemption is 12 months from the removal date.

Example:

C-2. A program's rating is removed effective February 2, 2023. The program cannot be rated for 12 months (until February 2, 2024). However, the program is exempt for 12 months and may provide PFCC until February 2, 2024. The program should submit a registration for SUTQ between August 6, 2023 – November 4, 2023 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

Rating removed (effective date)	February 2, 2023
Program cannot be rated for 12 months	February 2, 2024
Earliest the program can register (180 days before	August 6, 2023
exemption ends)	

12-month exemption period	February 2, 2023 – February 2, 2024
Latest the program can register (90 days before exemption ends)	November 4, 2023

Programs that are currently rated and **at any time do not meet the SUTQ standards** may have their rating removed as a result. Per Ohio Revised Code, these programs are exempt and may provide PFCC for 12 months without being rated. Programs whose ratings are removed for not meeting the standards can immediately submit a registration for SUTQ. However, the program should submit a registration for SUTQ **no later than 90 days before their exemption ends** to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services. The expiration of the exemption is 12 months from the removal date.

Examples:

C-3. The program's rating is removed effective April 12, 2022 after the review of the annual report. The program is exempt for 12-months and may provide PFCC until April 12, 2023. The program can submit a registration for SUTQ immediately after the rating is removed, but no later than January 12, 2024 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

C-4. The program's rating is removed effective September 6, 2022 because the program did not meet the professional development (PD) requirements. The program is exempt for 12-months and may provide PFCC until September 6, 2023. The program can submit a registration for SUTQ immediately after the rating is removed, but no later than June 8, 2023 to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

Frequently Asked Questions

- 1. What program types are not eligible for SUTQ but are permitted to provide PFCC?
 - In-home aides
 - Border state programs
 - Approved day camps

2. I have a licensed FCC program do I have to be SUTQ rated to provide PFCC services?

No. Effective March 16, 2023, licensed FCC programs are not required to be SUTQ rated to provide PFCC services.

3. I am a licensed child care provider who currently does not provide PFCC services. How do I sign up to become a PFCC provider now that I meet a SUTQ exemption? To provide PFCC services, licensed providers can begin the process in the OCLQS. This desk aid is available to assist with this process. You can review a <u>sample provider</u> agreement to learn more about PFCC requirements.

- 4. How will I know if my child care center program or ODE preschool and school-age program has to be SUTQ rated to provide PFCC? If the program provides PFCC to 25% or more of their licensed capacity, as displayed in OCLQS, the program must submit a registration and become SUTQ rated.
- 5. How do I withdraw my program from SUTQ if I meet one of the new exemptions? A program can withdraw from SUTQ by submitting a <u>JFS 01556</u> "Request to Withdraw from Step Up To Quality" to their licensing specialist.

The effective withdrawal date is the date requested on the <u>JFS 01556</u> or 30 days from the signature date on the <u>JFS 01556</u>, whichever is later.

- 6. What is my payment if I choose to no longer be SUTQ rated? Programs that withdraw from SUTQ will receive the lower payment of either the provider's customary rate to the public or the rate outlined in <u>Appendix A</u> to Rule 5101-2-16-10, of the OAC, for non-rated programs. The payment change takes place the Sunday following the day the SUTQ withdraw is effective.
- 7. My child care center is currently in the tenth month of my provisional license period with two months left of exemption status. Do I need to be SUTQ rated after the provisional period to continue to provide PFCC services? If you determine that your child care center is providing PFCC to 25% or more of your approved license capacity, you will need to submit a SUTQ registration no later than 90 days prior to expiration of your provisional licenses.
- 8. I have never been rated and I am not exempt. My program has accumulated 24 or more moderate and/or serious risk noncompliance points. As a result, I am not eligible to be SUTQ rated. Can I provide PFCC services? All licensed child care centers or ODE preschool and school-age programs must be SUTQ rated unless the program meets an exemption for PFCC. FCC programs are not required to participate in SUTQ.
- 9. My child care center operates a part-time preschool and provides care for schoolaged children before and after school and during school-out days at the same location. Is my program exempt?

Your program is not exempt from the requirement to be SUTQ rated, unless it meets the license capacity exemption, because your part-time preschool program and before and after school program operate during the school year.

10. My child care center program has never been SUTQ rated, so I submitted an initial SUTQ registration. I do not meet the standards for a rating and am not rated. Am I exempt?

No, initial registrations that do not result in a rating are not an exemption.

11. My child care center's SUTQ rating was removed. During the 12-month exemption period, I submitted a SUTQ registration, and I did not meet the standards for a rating. When does my exemption end? Because your rating was removed, you are exempt 12 months from the date of the rating removal. The program should work to align to the SUTQ standards and submit a

registration again. However, the program should submit a SUTQ registration no later than 90 days before your exemption ends to avoid a gap in payment and the ability to provide PFCC services.

- 12. My program only operates when schools are closed, such as fall, winter, and spring breaks, scheduled days off, and calamity/snow days. Am I exempt? Yes. However, if your program also operates on late start or early dismissal days when school is in session, then your program is no longer exempt and must be SUTQ rated to provide PFCC if the program provides PFCC to 25% or more of your approved license capacity.
- 13. My rating was removed effective April 2022. My 12-month exemption period ends in April 2023. When does my program have to be rated to continue to provide PFCC?

Programs providing PFCC who do not meet an exemption must be rated by the end of their current exemption period. The program should work to align to the SUTQ standards and submit a registration for SUTQ no later than 90 days prior to the end of the current exemption to prevent a gap in payment for PFCC.

14. Is a reduction/removal to zero the same things as being unrated?

No, they are two different concepts. An unrated program is a program that has never been rated in SUTQ. A previously rated program with a reduction/removal to zero is currently not rated and may meet one of the exemption criteria.

Temporary Closure Status Rules & Recommendations for Child Care Centers and Family Child Care Homes

Child care programs may use temporary closure status to stop operating for a period of time less than 12 months. The program may reopen any time within the 12 months.

Ohio Administrative Code requirements for temporary closure status include:

- → Child care programs must request temporary closure status in the Ohio Child Licensing and Quality System (OCLQS)
- \rightarrow Temporary closure periods cannot exceed 12 months
- → Child care programs cannot provide publicly funded child care (PFCC) or provide care to private pay children while in temporary closure status
- → An Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) provider agreement ends while in temporary closure status
- → Discontinuance of Step Up To Quality (SUTQ) ratings may occur for child care programs in temporary closure status for more than 90 days
- → Child care programs that do not reopen after 12 months may have their license permanently closed without hearing rights

What are some appropriate reasons child care programs may request temporary closure in OCLQS?

- \rightarrow Construction or major renovations
- \rightarrow A natural disaster or other emergency
- ightarrow Extended medical leave or family emergency for a family child care (FCC) home provider
- \rightarrow There are no children enrolled
- ightarrow There are not enough staff to provide care
- ightarrow A business decision to temporarily close without having a reopen date

What are some reasons child care programs should <u>not</u> request temporary closure in OCLQS?

- → Holiday/school breaks
- \rightarrow A summer/seasonal closure
- \rightarrow A communicable disease exposure
- ightarrow Cleaning the building or home after a communicable disease exposure
- ightarrow A vacation period or other short closure period with a known reopen date

What are some factors child care programs should consider when planning to reopen?

- → Inspections before reopening:
 - FCC homes must receive an inspection before they can reopen and serve children again
 - Child care centers may need an inspection before they can reopen and serve children again
- → Child care programs who wish to enroll PFCC eligible children must sign a new ODJFS provider agreement in OCLQS after reopening
- ightarrow Child care programs need to request reinstatement of their SUTQ rating when they reopen

What are some reasons child care programs should request permanent closure in OCLQS?

- \rightarrow The child care program still has no plan to reopen after 12 months in temporary closure status
- ightarrow The child care program loses their licensed space before they are able to change locations
- ightarrow The child care program has decided to permanently close
