
Valedictorian

2023-24 PROPOSED BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

Focused on empowering the students of today to conquer the challenges of tomorrow.

The Charlotte Valley CSD 2023-24 budget is carefully developed to remain focused on the mission to empower our students to conquer the challenges of tomorrow. The budget focuses on both short and long term goals to remain fiscally sustainable through unpredictable landscapes.

INVESTING IN PEOPLE

Education is driven by people—the students who we serve and those that help support them on the road to success. Our budget continues to invest in the people and student services that make Charlotte Valley strong. This year's budget ensures that those services remain intact, along with those who help provide them to our students—from transportation to instructional support to the maintenance staff. Enacting wise, long-term fiscal decision making now, will help sustain these services for the future.

THE FISCAL LANDSCAPE-SUSTAINABILITY TO PROSPERITY

Over the past few years, schools have gone through some of the most turbulent times in history—closures, challenging protocols, and a loss of instruction and relationships. To help combat this schools were provided an influx of funding to assist with closing these gaps. Schools developed new programs, offered tutoring and summer programming, hired additional staff, and purchased needed materials. Within the next 15 months, these COVID related funds will discontinue. The districts that begin to plan for this funding cliff now, will be in a better position to prosper later.

This year's budget begins this process of allocating financial resources in the areas that are most beneficial to the district's mission, knowing that supplemental COVID related funding will not be available to help offset expenses. All current positions and programs remain in the proposed 23-24 budget.

The District will receive enhanced state aid this year, due to the Governor and Legislature fully funding Foundation Aid, but it is also tempered by raging inflation. With careful planning, we aim to maintain our high level of programming and support for our district's students in this year's proposed budget and future ones thereafter.


PROVIDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS

The budget once again provides opportunities for students to grow and learn. We continue to offer AIS services in ELA and Math in the elementary, along with various AIS services in the middle and high schools. Students will be offered extended day programming through tutoring, Regents preparation, and summer school.

The District has placed an emphasis on providing students learning opportunities in the field of STEM by fully furnishing our dedicated STEM room with a variety of materials and supplies. The CVCS Robotics team has grown by both numbers and prestige.

Social and emotional learning have become a necessary, but valuable aspect of our learning program. We continue to provide school counseling, social work, and whole group skill building. Our dedicated MS/HS teams have developed a mentoring program focused on building strong peer-to-peer and student-adult relationships.

Students have opportunities to engage in co- and extracurricular activities, distance learning classes and in-person electives for both college and high school credit. Our strong relationship with BOCES provides students the programming option that best fits their learning style and interest.

2023-2024 Budget

Summary: A line-by-line look at expenditures

New York State law requires all school districts to present their budgets divided into three expenditure categories (program, administrative, and capital). Charlotte Valley's three-part budget is as follows:

Program 2023-24

\$8,582,338

Includes salaries and benefits for all teachers and staff who deliver instructional and pupil services (guidance, health, library/media, etc.), materials and supplies, athletics, and transportation costs

Administrative 2023-24

\$1,202,636

Includes salaries and benefits for all administrators, supervisors, and administrative clerical staff, curriculum development support, school board costs, legal costs, and tax collection costs.

Capital 2023-24

\$2,306,800

Includes salaries and benefits of all maintenance and custodial staff, debt service on buildings, school bus purchases, utilities, and general insurance.



This year's proposed tax levy increase is 2.99%, which is under the district's tax levy cap of 3.38%.

Since the proposed levy is under the cap, a simple majority (50%+1) is required for approval.

Over the past 8 years, the district has averaged a 1.25% increase.


On Thursday, February 16, students and staff at CVCS had a meet and greet with a certified therapy dog!


