Attendance Policy

In order to encourage student attendance, the following strategies and incentives shall apply:


Minimum Attendance for Course Credit

A student must be noted as present at 85% of a course's scheduled classes in order to earn credit for the course. Any excused absence, for which the student has completed assigned make-up work, will not be counted as an absence for the purposes of determining whether the student has attended sufficient classes to receive course credit under this provision.

In order to prevent loss of credit for failure to attend, the district will take the following steps:

- When a student has been marked as absent for 10% of a course's classes, the district shall notify the student and his parent(s) or persons in parental relation that the student is approaching the limit of absences for losing course credit for failure to attend class. The notice will include the school's attendance for credit policy, the actual number of classes the student may miss before forfeiting the right to earn credit, and the actual number of classes missed to date;
- A student and his parent(s) or persons in parental relation will be advised one month before the completion of the course if the student is in jeopardy of losing credit for failure to attend. The notice will include the school's attendance for credit policy, the actual number of classes the student may miss before forfeiting the right to earn credit, and the actual number of classes missed to date;
- Teachers will provide makeup work upon request so that students who are in jeopardy of forfeiting class credits due to excused absences have the opportunity to earn credit for the course;
- Where a student is in jeopardy of losing credit for excessive absences, the Building Principal shall be responsible for reviewing attendance records, determining eligibility for makeup work for excused absences, and arranging student makeup opportunities with teachers, including deadlines.





Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that Charlotte Valley Central School, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education record. However, Charlotte Valley Central School may disclose appropriate designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Charlotte Valley Central School to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor roll or other recognition lists;
- · Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, the New York State Education Law §2-1 and two federal laws require school districts receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with student names, addresses and telephone listings - unless parents have advised the school district that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

If you do not want Charlotte Valley Central School to disclose some or all directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing by September 15, 2020. Charlotte Valley Central School has designated the following information as directory information.

- Student's name
- Address
- Telephone listing
- Electronic mail address
- Photograph

- · Date and place of birth
- Major field of study
- · Dates of attendance
- Grade level
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- · Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- · Degrees, honors, and awards received
- The most recent educational agency or institution attended.

NYS requires that all teachers seeking permanent certification submit a videotaped classroom lesson. As a result, students in routine classroom situations may be videotaped by teachers seeking permanent certification from the state. If you do not want a your child included in these videotapes, you should inform Charlotte Valley Central School in writing that videotapes including your child should not be used as part of the teacher certification process.

- 45 days of the day the School receives a request for access. Parents or eligible students should submit to the School Principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The School official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- 2. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parents or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading. Parents or eligible students may ask the School to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the School Principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the School decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the School will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advised them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- 3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the School as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the School has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent of a student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his

Dignity for All Students Act

"New York State has passed the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) to address behavior at school. A student's ability to learn and to meet high academic standards, and a school's ability to educate its students is compromised by incidents of discrimination or harassment including bullying, taunting, or intimidation. The Dignity Act makes it the official policy of New York State that all students in public schools have the right to an education free of discrimination and harassment.

"The Dignity Act addresses material incidents of harassment and discrimination of students by students, as well as of students by faculty and staff.

"Material incidents of harassment and discrimination include, but are not limited to: threats, intimidation or abuse based on a person's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practices, disability, sexual orientation, gender (including gender identity or expression), or sex.

"The word "bullying" does not appear in the Dignity Act. Rather, bullying behavior is a manifestation of the larger problems of discrimination and harassment that the Dignity Act seeks to prevent and prohibit.

"Establishing and sustaining a school environment free of discrimination and harassment involves taking a close look at a school's climate and culture. School climate and culture have a profound impact on student achievement, behavior, and reflects the school community's culture."


Reporting of acts of discrimination and/or harassment can be made in the following ways:

- Principal or Superintendent
- To any adult

Cyberbullying

"School districts in New York State may take action when students engage in offcampus conduct that would foreseeably create a risk of substantial disruption within the school and should consider doing so, as part of a comprehensive approach to intervening to prevent harassment and cyberbullying that includes interventions other than out-of-school suspensions.

Annual Notice Asbestos Management Program

An October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519). The act required the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to develop regulations for addressing asbestos in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, the EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule (40 CFR Part 763 Subpart E). This rule stipulated, and our district has complied with, the following key requirements:


- Identification of asbestos-containing materials in all school buildings.
- Development and implementation of asbestos management plans for each school.

- Regular surveillance and reinspections of the condition of asbestos in the buildings.
- Designation and training of a person to oversee asbestos activities within the district and to ensure compliance with the regulations.

This memorandum is to advise you that asbestos management plans for the district schools were developed following the EPA ruling. These plans are regularly updated and are available for you to review.

Pesticide Notification Request

New York State Education Law Section 409-H requires all public and non-public elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year. Occasionally, we need to use pesticides on a limited basis.

The Charlotte Valley Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are NOT subject to prior notification requirements:

- The school remains unoccupied for 72 continuous hours after an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas accessible to children;
- Boric acid and related compounds;
- The application of EPA designated bio pesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging or biting inspects including venomous spiders, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect about an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

Right to Know Notification


In accordance with ESEA Section 1111(h)(6) PARENTS-RIGHT-TO-KNOW, the Charlotte Valley Central School District is notifying every parent of a student in a Title I school that you have the right and may request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's classroom teacher. This information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's classroom teachers including, at a minimum, the following:

- 1. Whether the teacher has met State qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
- 2. Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which State qualification of licensing criteria have been waived.

- 3. The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree.
- 4. Whether the child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.

If at any time your child has been taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks by a teacher not highly qualified, the school will notify you.




