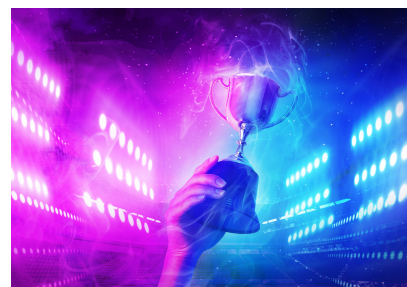
Available: Begonia Dragon Wing, Impatiens, Geraniums, Million Bells, Million Bells Mixed colors, and Wave Petunias.

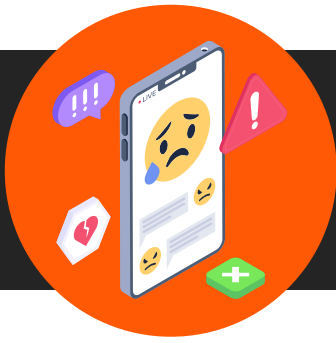
Mrs. Karrah Ray's 6th Grade Social Studies class at Paris Middle School has it going on!

CYBER-BULLYING

What is it, exactly?

WE WANT OUR PARENTS TO BE INFORMED ABOUT THE NATURE, DETAILS, AND POSSIBLE CONSEQUENCES OF CYBER-BULLYING.

We chose to start this weekly series highlighting the impacts of cyberbullying in our student's lives in order to keep our parents involved and informed.

We hope that this information will give you the resources that you need in order to talk to your child about the consequences of cyberbullying, and actions that they should take to stop or prevent it when they encounter it. In the end, we must all work together to prevent cyber-bullying in our schools and in the lives of our children.

WHAT IS CYBER-BULLYING?

Cyberbullying includes sending, posting, or sharing negative, harmful, false, or mean content about someone else. It can include sharing personal or private information about someone else causing embarrassment or humiliation. Some cyberbullying even crosses the line into unlawful or criminal behavior.

WHERE CAN I FIND RESOURCES TO PREVENT IT?

Let's face it: Some online spaces can be full of negative, rude, or downright mean behavior. But what counts as cyberbullying? Help your children learn what is -- and what isn't -- cyberbullying, and give them the tools they'll need to combat the problem.

CYBERBULLYING HAS UNIQUE CONCERNS IN THAT IT CAN BE:

Persistent – Digital devices offer an ability to immediately and continuously communicate 24 hours a day, so it can be difficult for children experiencing cyberbullying to find relief.

Permanent – Most information communicated electronically is permanent and public, if not reported and removed. A negative online reputation, including for those who bully, can impact college admissions, employment, and other areas of life.

Hard to Notice – Because teachers and parents may not overhear or see cyberbullying taking place, it is harder to recognize.
