Voters to decide on \$12.1 million proposed budget, proposition, board election

Budget preserves opportunities for students, stays below tax levy limit

On Tuesday, May 16, 2023, Worcester Central School voters will decide on a \$12,158,746 budget proposal for the 2023-2024 school year that maintains all academic and extracurricular programming for students as they currently exist. The proposed budget is a 2.3% increase in spending year-over-year.

"Our goal is to continue providing excellent educational opportunities to our students," said Superintendent Tim Gonzales. "We work hard to be fiscally responsible, keeping our taxpayers in mind, and believe this budget proposal is a reflection of this." Voters will also vote on a vehicle purchase reserve proposition, and to elect two members of the Board of Education.

Merger and Capital Project Update

A majority of Schenevus voters cast "no" ballots on a proposed merger on Wednesday, Feb. 15, ending a process that began more than two years ago.

The vote was the final say in the proposed annexation merger, which would have combined the two districts into one under the leadership of the Worcester CSD Board and superintendent. Had the vote been positive, Worcester would have annexed Schenevus, effective July 1, 2024.

"The voters have made it clear that this is not the direction they want our districts to go, but the partnership we have built with Schenevus can still continue," Worcester CSD Superintendent Tim Gonzales said. "We look forward to continuing to collaborate and work together in the future."

Worcester's capital project is still underway despite the outcome of the merger vote, and at the April 12th board meeting, William H Lane Incorporated was named as the winning bidder for construction management. Construction will begin late Spring of 2024.



Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability Designation

Worcester Central School has received its 2023-2024 Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability Designation and is proud to inform our community that we have achieved the designation of "Local Support and Improvement" (LSI), what was previously called "Good Standing".

As you may recall, in 2016, Worcester Central School was designated as a Focus District based on performance of economically disadvantaged students in Grades 3-8 on the NYS ELA & Math assessments. Initially, the New York State Education Department (NYSED) reviewed our district, requiring both the school and district to create a School Comprehensive Education Plan (SCEP) and a District Comprehensive Improvement Plan (DCIP) beginning in the 2016-2017 school year. SCEP and DCIP teams were created and those plans have since been maintained every year with the goal to improve academic improvement.

We celebrate this new designation and will continue to work diligently for our students in years to come!





Budget Vote Information

What will I be voting on?

- \$12,158,746 budget proposal for 2023-24
- Vehicle Purchase Reserve Fund
- 2 school board seats (see p. 3)

When and where do I vote?

Tuesday, May 16, 2023 from 12-8 p.m. at the Worcester CSD Library

Who is eligible to vote?

District residents who are U.S. citizens, 18 years old or older and residents for at least 30 days prior to the vote; and are not otherwise disqualified under the Education Law.

Do I need to register to vote?

No, but the WCSD may require all persons offering to vote to provide one form of proof of residency pursuant to education law.

How can I vote by absentee ballot?

Absentee ballots are available by application for residents unable to vote on the day of the referendum. Absentee ballots should be requested at least two weeks prior to the vote date. To request an absentee ballot, please contact the district clerk, Wendy Elliott by phone at 607-397-8785 Ext. 116 or in-person at the district office, 198 Main St, Worcester, NY 12197. All ballots are due by 5 p.m. on May 16.

WHAT IF THE BUDGET VOTE FAILS?

The Board of Education can adopt a contingent budget which would require WCSD not to increase the current levy by any amount.

To make up the \$78,856 incurred with a contingency budget, WCSD would look to possibly cut program expenses or increase the amount we would have to take from our fund balance.

Alternatively, the district may choose to hold a revote to be held on June 20th.
