

Enhancing Parent Communications

In order to improve communications, the District recently conducted a survey to determine how parents prefer to receive information. Jasculca Terman was hired to analyze current communications tools and tactics and parent-survey responses. The Chicago-based strategic communications firm presented their findings and recommendations to the Board of Education at the April 12 meeting. About 23 percent of parents responded with the following results:

- 94% of parents consider District communications to be good or excellent

- 90% consider the amount of communication to be “about right”
- 82% of parents prefer to receive information via email
- 80% of respondents say the Board and Administration involve parents, community, and students in decisions

Other key findings of the survey:

- 93% of parents are primarily interested in school-specific information
- 84% indicated an interest in District news
- 74% read the School Scene District newsletter and find it to be comprehensive, well organized, and well designed

The top four preferred channels of communication were:

- School-based communication (emails from principals)
- School employees
- Website
- District newsletters

Areas identified as needing improvement involve:

- Retooling the website to refresh the design and make navigation within the site

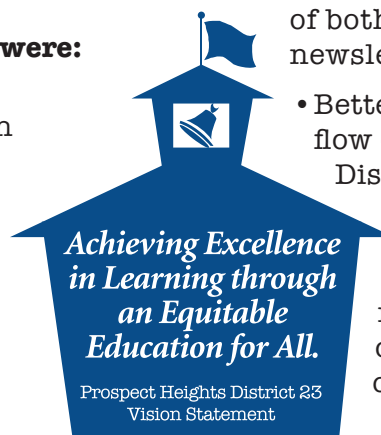
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more user-friendly by adding drop-down menus and color-coding the calendar

- Offering greater consistency of content, design, and translations of both school and District newsletters
- Better coordination of the flow of information from District to principals and between principals to produce more cohesive school newsletters and other forms of communication

Ten Ideas for FREE Summertime Learning

One of the greatest challenges for parents is keeping children engaged in learning over the summer. Research suggests that even the most basic learning activities can help students maintain their academic sharpness during extended school breaks. Most importantly, engage with your child and have fun learning together. Here are some free activities that are worth considering as you plan your child's summer.

1. Read to your child and/or have your child read to you.

This simple activity is the most effective way to stave off the "summer decline." For optimal results, read every day. For help selecting books that match your child's age, interests, and abilities, consult with your child's teacher or the children's librarian at your local library. 2. Log on to Study Island

Study Island is a leading academic software provider of eLearning programs that help students master math, language arts, and science skills. All students will receive a letter from their school with a unique log-in and password for Study Island. Your child's level is matched to his/her MAP scores. This online experience will assist your child in both maintaining and staying ahead over the summer months. The programs are designed to capture your children's attention, hold their interest, encourage progress, and keep them engaged. Study Island features:

- Built-in games to engage children in learning
- Experience points, coins, badges, and other incentives
- Animations to capture children's attention and help them retain what is learned



3. Visit your local library

Take advantage of the many free programs and activities that Prospect Heights, Indian Trails, and Arlington Heights libraries offer throughout the summer. The links to the three library websites can be found by clicking on the Community tab of the District 23 website.

4. Visit the parks

Prospect Heights, Arlington Heights, and Wheeling all offer phenomenal opportunities for kids to play outdoors. The links to these park districts can be accessed through the Community tab on the District 23 website.



5. Visit nature centers

The Forest Preserves of Cook County maintain and operate a number of nature centers that are free to the public. River Trail Nature Center is located on Milwaukee Avenue in Northbrook. Take your child to walk through sugar maple woods along the river on the self-guiding trails, learn of the past and present in the exhibit building, and visit a few of the native animals. Younger children may enjoy the nature discovery area where they can climb in an eagle nest, crawl in a fox den, create their own puppet shows, and more.

**6. Go on a backyard bug safari**

You don't need any special tools to launch a bug safari. Prowl the garden and turn over a few rocks and you are bound to find something interesting. A few clear containers are useful additions to temporarily trap, study, and identify the insects. There are many library books and, of course, the Internet to help you discover science in your own backyard.

**7. Write and illustrate a book**

You can make this activity as elaborate or as simple as you like. Have your child write a story about one or more of your summer activities. Create your own fictional character and make up your own adventures. There are many library books, kits, and other resources available to offer ideas and inspire your child to get creative.

8. Cook a meal

Everyday tasks can become meaningful learning opportunities. Teach your child to cook his/her favorite meal. Look through cookbooks together and find something new your child would like to try. Following a recipe involves math, science, and language arts concepts.

9. Create a collage

Go for a walk and make a collage from all the nature objects you find along the way. Bring a basket or bucket to carry home what you collect. This fun and easy activity is a great way to incorporate nature with arts and crafts.

10. Road trip scavenger hunt

Give each child a list of items to watch for while driving. Check off each item when they find it. The list can be made up ahead of time and adjusted for various ages and driving environs, i.e. urban, rural, suburban. For a younger child who can't read, draw a little picture of each item next to the word. A-to-Z and color scavenger hunts are other options. ●

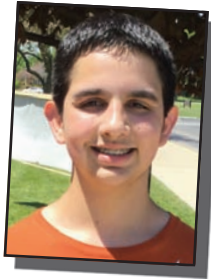

Consider the many attributes necessary to be a successful volunteer: generosity and the willingness to give of your time to help others; understanding as you learn that your life may be very

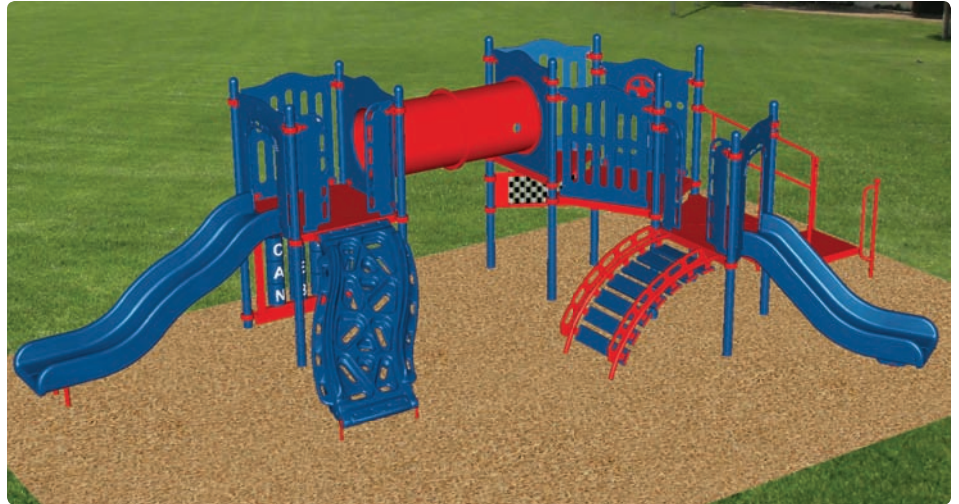
different from those you are serving; the empathy and compassion that inspires you to work to make someone else's life better, and the dedication to see a project through to completion.

for completing the registration process online.

Students at MacArthur and Sullivan schools, in grades four through eight, will continue

to be issued iPads for use both at home and at school. This arrangement allows us to provide a 1:1 learning environment that is available 24/7.

District 23 recognizes that the role and purpose of technology in the 21st Century has shifted dramatically toward a fully integrated and seamless presence. For our students, electronic devices have become the equalizer that provides access to information and the ability to collaborate, create, and connect with people throughout the world. By giving them iPads, students have the opportunity for differentiation and personalization of education. ●
