

At the November 2014 Board of Education meeting, the administration presented the Enrollment Projections for the 2015-2016 school year. This marked the beginning of the administrations' work on the 2015-2016 budget. Following the Board's guidelines for classroom sizes, the administration developed the number of classrooms for each grade level also taking into account classroom needs for bilingual and



special education self-contained classrooms. From this information, the administration is able to determine staffing requirements for the school year based on number of classrooms and specific student needs.

Once the enrollment, classroom and staffing projections are completed, more than half of the budget work is done. In early spring, administration is also working with different teams and departments on their specific needs ranging from curriculum, technology, building and grounds, transportation and other support services that all support the instructional program while staying within the Board's policy of maintaining a sound financial fund balance.

At the June 10, 2015 Board of the Education meeting, the Board will approve putting on display the 2015-2016 Tentative Budget. After approval, the budget will be posted on the District's website under the Business Office and a hard copy will be available to view at the District's Administration Offices. Work will continue on the budget refining revenue and expenditures as more information is received from local, state and government sources. The final budget adoption will occur at the September 9, 2015 Board of Education meeting. •

Pegistration is in full swing for the For the 2015-2016 school year. Families have received a letter along with their Infosnap code to complete the registration process online. Registration fees for students in grades 1 - 8 have increased this year. The increases this year will be used to offset the costs associated with the increase in technological devices that will be available for student use in 2015-2016.

In the 21st century, the role and purpose of technology have dramatically shifted toward a fully integrated and seamless presence. For our students, technology devices have become the equalizer that provides access to information; the ability to collaborate, create, and connect with people throughout the world; and the opportunity for differentiation and personalization of education.

Beginning with our students at MacArthur Middle School in the 2015-16 school year, every student will be issued an iPad for use at school and at home for educational purposes. All of our other schools will see increases in the number of computers, laptops, and tablet devices next year.

Studio GC, the District's architect of record, will provide construction management services for the project. United Analytical will provide project management and air sampling services for the

asbestos abatement project. Overhead mechanical work in the gymnasium took place over spring break 2015 which will allow the District to use most of the gym floor space for storage of classroom and office items during construction.

Contractors will begin disassembling mechanical units such as the boiler as soon as the heat can safely be turned off. Removal of the chiller and classroom unit ventilators will begin after students are dismissed for the summer. Asbestos abatement will

begin on Sunday, June 7, 2015 to be completed by Sunday, June 14, 2015, turning the building then back over to the other contractors to

complete their work with substantial completion scheduled for August 14, 2015.

As always with school summer construction, we have a very short window to complete the project before staff and students return in August. •
