

# 2016-2017 District Budget

he budget process begins by estimating enrollment for the upcoming school year. The projections for the 2016-2017 school year were presented at the November 2015 Board of Education meeting.

By following the Board guidelines for classroom sizes, the administration is able to establish the number of sections required for each grade level, taking into account classroom needs for

bilingual and special education. With this information, the staffing requirements for the school year are determined

The Board of Education will approve a tentative budget for the 2016-2017 school year at the June meeting. Once approved, the budget will be posted on the District website under the Business Office; a hard copy will be available at the Administration offices.

- Visit zoos, museums, or free exhibits and engage your child in discussion by asking questions and motivating them to ask you questions as well.
- Read with your child, or have them read to you. This is one of the simplest, yet most effective, activities for skill development.
- Engage your child in simple math activities at the grocery store.

## Dwight D. Eisenhower School Grades Pre-K to 1st

#### **Special Olympics YOUNG ATHLETES**

**F** or the past six years, the early childhood, kindergarten, and firstgrade classes at Eisenhower School have participated in the Young Athletes program offered through Special Olympics Illinois. This is the fourth year that MacArthur Middle School students have volunteered.

This all-inclusive sports-play program for children with developmental delays and their typically developing peers is designed to introduce those, ages 2-7 years, to the world of sports. The culmination of the program is Young Athletes Day, which, this year, will take place at Eisenhower School on Monday, May 23. The morning session runs from 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.; the afternoon session is from 12:30 p.m. to 2 p.m. This fun-filled, end-of-year event is an opportunity to showcase the program and the skills students have gained through their participation.

Young Athletes has proven to be enormously beneficial on multiple levels to our youngest students. The activities help children improve physically, developmentally and socially through two specific levels of play. Level 1 includes physical activities focused on developing fundamental motor tracking and hand-eye coordination. Level 2 concentrates on the application of these physical activities through a sports skills activity program. Foundational skills like walking and running, balancing and jumping, trapping and catching, throwing, striking, and kicking as well as more advanced skills, are addressed. The curriculum provided with the program is aligned with the Illinois Early Learning Standards and the developing skills are consistent with Special Olympics sports play. Young Athletes also encourages the inclusion of students of all ability

levels to work together and compete at their individual levels.

Young Athletes is coordinated by Chrystyna Sroka, District 23 Special Education Coordinator, Luke Lambatos, Eisenhower Principal, and Jenna Samp, Eisenhower P.E. Teacher.

For our students, technology devices have become the equalizer that provides access to information, the ability to collaborate, create, and connect with people throughout the world, and the opportunity for differentiation and personalization of education.

At MacArthur Middle School, every student in grades six through eight is issued an iPad for use at school and at home; this allows us to continue to provide a one-on-one learning environment that is available 24/7.
