7th & 8th graders visit Williamsburg/Monticello

On the dates of October 20th, 21st, and 22nd of October, select 7th and 8th grade students, along with several staff members, took a long drive the Appalachian Mountains through Williamsburg, Virginia Beach, Monticello, and the historic town of Jamestown. On Thursday, the group departed from RMS at 6:00 am, to begin the 9-hour, 590 mile trip all the way to Virginia Beach. Once at Virginia Beach, the students and staff members were able to experience the beauty and the tranquility of the Atlantic Ocean in front of their very eyes. Students were able to search along the shore and the shallow waters freely for about an hour and a half, before heading to Golden Corral for dinner. Once dinner was finished up, an hour-long drive inland led the group to Williamsburg, and their hotel.

In Williamsburg the next morning, the exploration of the landscape surrounding the land of Virginia began at Jamestown, after a short trip down the Colonial Parkway, a 23-mile road completed in 1957, that extends from Yorktown, past Williamsburg, and ending at the Jamestown Settlement. Students and staff members received the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to explore the historic site, including trying on armor, exploring the Susan Constant, the largest ship out of the three used, and even exploring a remake of the Powhatan Indian tribal home. Once the exploration was over, the gift shops and the cafe became crowded with students and staff members. Ryan Boyer, an 8th grader, who bought the Chicken Tenders said, "They were alright, but they could have been a little bit crispier."



Once lunch was over, the groups departed for Colonial Williamsburg for a city tour, a British band experience, which was actually purely coincidental, and stopped for dinner at Shield's Tavern, a restaurant in Colonial Williamsburg. After dinner, the ghost tours began. Students and staff members toured throughout Colonial Williamsburg by the light of lit torches beside the sidewalks, hearing several spine-tingling stories, some including a bossy woman, a man longing for his kids, and even a vampire terrorizing the town. After the ghost tours, students boarded the bus back to the hotel, about a ten to twenty minute drive.

On the final day, students and staff went to explore the beauty and pristineness of Thomas Jefferson's handbuilt Monticello. Students and staff were able to explore Jefferson's own home on a guided tour, and learned about his home's history, along with his many achievements including founding the University of Virginia not far away in Charlottesville. He also drafted the Declaration of Independence and the Statute for Religious Freedom. Once finished at the house, students walked down the trail from Jefferson's Grave, where Thomas Jefferson was buried. Students and staff members ate lunch, and explored the many wonders of Monticello. After the sun set on Monticello, Jamestown, and Williamsburg, the 7th and 8th grade students and staff headed home back to Rushville Middle School.


