Sacramental Catechesis: The Sacrament of Matrimony

While I have been on retreat in Alabama, I have spent some of my prayer time before the Blessed Sacrament in the priests' chapel. One of the stained glass windows is a depiction of Jesus and Mary at the Wedding Feast in Cana. The scene has Our Lord and Our Lady to the left of the window, with the head waiter in the center holding a glass of wine with stone water jugs at his feet. Toward the background is the bride and bridegroom at the table, looking curious as to what phenomenon is taking place. The stained glass window is a subtle, picturesque representation of Jesus' first miracle recorded in Scripture. This miracle of the Wedding Feast at Cana is so much more than simply turning water into wine; it conveys something deeper and more profound to who Jesus is in salvation history and to the profound identity and mission of the Sacrament of Matrimony in the life of the Church. In both the earthly life of Christ and in those who enter into Christian matrimony, the scene at the Wedding Feast at Cana gives ample commentary on the dramatic, existential transformation that sets people's lives on course for unification with divinity.

An incredibly striking meditation on Our Lord's experience at the Wedding Feast at Cana, especially as it relates to Him and His relationship with the Virgin Mary, is taken from John Henry Cardinal Newman's reflection titled, "Our Lord Refuses Sympathy." It is worth quoting Cardinal Newman in full:

The last day of the earthly intercourse [communication] between Jesus and Mary was at the marriage feast at Cana. Yet even then there was something taken from that blissful intimacy, for they no longer lived simply for each other but showed themselves in public and began to take their place in the dispensation that was opening. He manifested forth His glory by His first miracle—and hers also by making her intercession the medium of it. He honored her still more by breaking through the appointed order of things for her sake and, though His time of miracles was not come, anticipating it at her instance. While He wrought His miracle, however, He took leave of her in the words "Woman, what is between thee and Me? (John 2:4). Thus, he parted with her absolutely, though He parted with a blessing. It was leaving Paradise [the comfort of the family home] feeble and alone. For in truth it was fitting that He who was to be the true High Priest should thus, while He exercised His office for the whole race of man, be free from all human ties and sympathies of the flesh..."What is between Me and thee, O woman?" is the offertory before the oblation of the Host. O my dear Lord, Thou who hast given up Thy mother for me, give me grace cheerfully to give up all my earthly friends and relations for Thee. (Newman, Newman on Lent: Meditations and Sermons, pages 11-12)

Newman's reflection seems a bit jaw-dropping when it views Jesus' relationship with His mother as now forever changed. With the miracle at Cana, Jesus and Mary's relationship as mother and son is completely altered: no longer can their relationship be serenely, comfortably, and quietly between the two of them. Now, with the manifestation of Jesus' divinity, He must be Her Lord and Savior and the special relationship between mother and son will take a backseat to Jesus' vocation.

This begs the question: what is Jesus' vocation? Certainly, the initial answer is for Him to suffer and die for humanity—this is absolutely true in all respects. However, there is something more to Jesus' vocation that fulfills why Mary brought the issue of the wine running empty to Jesus at Cana. It also says something significant about the Sacrament of Matrimony. After all, it is the bridegroom's responsibility in the ancient world to make sure all food and drinks were properly provided for during the celebration. For Mary to make this request to Jesus, she is indicating that He somehow is to take on the responsibility of the bridegroom. Mary, moreover, was not simply asking Jesus to provide ordinary wine to the wedding guests; she was asking Jesus to provide the *supernatural wine prophesied by some of the Old Testament prophets, particularly Isaiah. In these prophecies God Himself will provide a superabundance of wine to His people, which alludes to a great wedding feast in which God and His people will be wholly united as one—humanity and divinity. This is what Mary was alluding to in her statement to Jesus, "they have no wine." Jesus' response to Mary is simply, "Woman, what concern is this between you and me?" Simply put, Jesus was saying to His mother in a veiled sense: if I go forward with my vocation as the bridegroom of God's people, particularly at this juncture here at Cana, our relationship will be wholly different. It will mean the end of the quiet and serene life of Nazareth. This miracle, the beginning of my vocation as bridegroom to God's people, will be the beginning of the mission to Calvary.*

Jesus enacts His first miracle: the miracle announcing He is the divine bridegroom who has come to fulfill the Old Testament prophecies of uniting His bride, the Church and God's people, to Himself through the mission of healing, teaching, and His sacrificial death on the Cross. This, in order to bring eternal life to those wedded to Christ as His mystical bride. Jesus did this and continues to do this today. At Cana, Jesus had to reject a dimension of His relationship with Mary, His mother, for the greater good of His identity as bridegroom. Later, His apostles would do this in their relationships with others in order to follow Him. Today, this is especially true of the "sacraments of service" commonly known as Holy Orders and Matrimony. I already mentioned how priestly ordination is called to this missionary vocation of being Christ the High Priest to His Church, in which priests have to sacrifice relationships for the greater good of their vocation. Likewise, but in a different way, husbands and wives are called to be the sacramental image of Christ and the Church's spousal union to each other, usually this means relationships with others will change. All of this is impossible to do on a couple's own effort—they need to develop an individual and spousal prayer life together in union with God. Also, it is vitally important for a married couple to see the principal task of their marriage is not natural bliss or happiness, but working together and for each other to grow in holiness—to grow in sainthood together. This is the missionary dimension of their vocation because, when a couple strives to do this in their marriage, they image *sacramentally Christ's love for His Church. In other words, their marriage becomes a conduit of God's love for others in the Church; bride and bridegroom work with God to sanctify their marriage and the world around them! When Christian married couples live out their vocation in this way, their marriage is truly a sacramental blessing for the entire Church!*

OCIA LESSON FOR THIS WEEK

**IS JESUS REALLY PRESENT IN THE EUCHA-
RIST?**

Jesus promised to give food from heaven that would be his flesh and blood (John 6:51-56). He fulfilled this promise at the Last Supper, when he took the bread and said explicitly "this is my Body" and when he took the wine and said "this is the chalice of my Blood." Jesus added, "Do this in memory of me." (Lk 22:19)

So when the priest speaks the words of consecration in the Mass, the bread and wine become the body and blood of Jesus Christ. The Church calls this change 'transubstantiation' because the substance of bread and wine are really changed, becoming the substance of Jesus Christ himself.

We honor the real presence of the Eucharist by genuflecting, kneeling and praying before the tabernacle. Sometimes the Eucharistic host is placed in a monstrance so that we can see the host and offer him adoration.
