

Sacramental Catechesis: The Holy Eucharist

Years ago my classmates and I in the seminary took a trip to the Holy Land for a week-long retreat, together with sightseeing the holy sites in Israel. It was a splendid experience and the trip was deeply moving, although it seemed like we were running from one place to another. One day we embarked on visiting the site where the Last Supper took place and decided to have Mass in the chapel dedicated to the spot where Jesus celebrated the first Mass and instituted the Holy Eucharist. We had two priests accompany us on our Holy Land trip because the rest of us were transitional deacons. Each day of the pilgrimage one of us would assist the priests as the deacon for the Mass. At the site of the Last Supper, one of my classmates chose to assist as the deacon. However, he forgot to bring his diaconal stole with him on the trip; he asked to borrow mine for conducting his diaconal duties on this special and solemn celebration. My stole had reversible colors depending on the liturgical season or day: one side was white and the other was purple. As my classmate draped the stole over his shoulder, he could only see the frontside of the stole—which was clearly white. But on his backside, the stole flipped over to the purple side. He did not notice this error and as he was processing down to the altar, I had a little chuckle. After Mass I said to him jokingly, “So, you’re still observing Lent, while we are celebrating Holy Thursday?” Perplexed at what I meant by this question, I explained to my classmate the mixed color arrangement on his stole. He shrugged it off and we both had a good laugh.


Since that incident with my classmate, I have given much thought to the Eucharist and its connection with the Lenten season. If we were to look at Jesus’ public ministry we could pinpoint the timeframe when a so-called “proto-Lenten” season began during his earthly sojourn. This proto-Lenten season began after Simon Peter’s profession of Jesus’ identity in Matthew 16. Once Jesus’ identity is finally revealed to His disciples, Jesus begins to talk about His looming Passion and death. Thus, from Caesarea-Philippi, Jesus and His disciples begin their long journey to Jerusalem, culminating in the miracle and institution of the sacramental reality of Jesus’ Passion, death, and Resurrection—The Holy Eucharist. Our Lord indicated approximately a year prior to the Last Supper in Capernaum that He would offer His flesh and blood to give life to others. This was the Bread of Life Discourse in John 6 and Jesus’ cryptic language caused many people to walk away from Him. Yet, there were a few who believed Jesus’ words, although they were completely puzzled as to how this could happen and why. The clouds of self-mortification were enveloping Jesus’ disciples even on this occasion and only those who were humble and could live with the uncertainty of Jesus’ words, at least momentarily, persevered till the climatic moment of the Eucharistic words of institution at the Last Supper, giving evidence of what Jesus meant by giving His flesh and blood for the life of the world a year prior in Capernaum. The disciples, having journeyed through their own Lenten observance, had their eyes opened, but did not fully realize the magnitude and power of what Jesus instituted. This would come after the Resurrection.

What Jesus was preparing His disciples for experiencing and understanding in their faith journey was a monumental renewal of God’s covenantal bond with Israel. Only this time, Israel would be expanded to the Gentile nations. To create a covenant in the Old Testament was to enter symbolically and realistically into a blood relationship with another person. This was symbolized in sacrificial offerings in which the animal sacrificed, along with its’ blood, would come to be a consummation of sorts between God and His people. This bond symbolized and quite realistically spoke of the irrevocable relationship God made with Israel. While animal sacrifices were the symbolic expression of God’s covenant with Israel, it was unthinkable in ancient Israel to have covenant sacrifices without partaking of a meal. This was true at Passover and the Sinai covenant God made with Israel when Moses, Aaron, Nadab, and Abihu went up the mountain to dine with the Lord (Ex. 24:9-11). Given this ancient Jewish context, the institution of the Holy Eucharist was necessary in order to complete the New Covenant Jesus enacts through His Cross and Resurrection. Just as partaking of the sacrificial meal in the Old Testament was symbolically a sharing in God’s covenantal love for Israel, even more so is the Eucharist a literal sharing in the life of Jesus Christ—the life He gives us through the power of His death and Resurrection. It took a Lenten journey for the disciples to come to fully appreciate the beauty of the New Covenant in Jesus’ flesh and blood.

As we begin this Lenten season, I encourage all of you to take time to reflect, study, and pray about how this Lent will deepen your understanding, appreciation, and faith in the Holy Eucharist. Check out Brant Pitre’s *Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist*, which is a tremendous, eye-opening account of the Holy Eucharist and, without it, Jesus’ death on the Cross would not have been understood as a sacrifice. I pray that each of you have a blessed Lenten season and let us follow Jesus this Lent to the Upper Room for the greatest drama in human history!

ARCHDIOCESAN LENTEN REGULATIONS

The Church has always helped us fulfill these words of Jesus by prescribing very definite penance for all Catholics, so that we too might have Eternal life. Accordingly, the Pope and the American Bishops have outlined obligatory fast and abstinence as follows:

Ash Wednesday (Wednesday March 5th, 2025) and Good Friday (April 18th, 2025) are days of *abstinence (refraining from meat)* for all Catholics *from the age of 14 onwards*. On these two days, *fast*, as well as *abstinence*, is also obligatory for those *from the ages of 18-59*. Abstinence means refraining from meat. Fast means one full meal a day, with two smaller meals and nothing between meals (liquids are permitted). No Catholic will lightly excuse himself or herself from this obligation.

All Fridays in Lent are days of *abstinence* from meat. Here again Catholics will not hold themselves lightly excused, but if there is a serious health problem, this obligation would not apply.
