Sacramental Catechesis: The Sacrament of Confirmation


I'm sure many of you reading this bulletin article remember your Confirmation. It's usually one of the first sacraments you remember receiving after your First Communion. For most Confirmandi, they receive this sacrament at the conclusion of their 8th grade year. I remember receiving my Confirmation a little later in my religious formation. Since I didn't grow up going to Catholic grade school, I made the adult decision to receive my Confirmation in my early twenties. In fact, I received the Sacrament of Confirmation on Pentecost Sunday, May 19, 2002 at the Cathedral Basilica. I was confirmed by Archbishop (later Cardinal) Rigali and I took on the name: John Vianney. Looking back, the only thing I can remember of that day was Archbishop Rigali saying to me, "John Vianney, be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit...", as he was anointing me with Sacred Chrism. I also remember having my Uncle Steve as my sponsor and celebrating my Confirmation back at my house with the table covered in a red cloth. While these memories are blurred reflections on that important day, over the years I've come to appreciate the significance of receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation in my life and how it has shaped me as a Christian man.

Continuing our journey through learning more about the sacraments of the Church, I want to speak about the Sacrament of Confirmation. In recent years, most people get confirmed at, or near, the conclusion of their 8th grade year—as I mentioned above. When I work with 8th graders preparing for this sacrament and ask them why they want to be confirmed, their answer usually dovetails into this statement: "I want to become an adult in the Church." While many of them might not articulate what that thoroughly means, they do, however, intuitively understand that their faith should lead them into greater personal freedom and responsibility. Freedom and responsibility are intertwined and you can't have one without the other. Confirmation, in part, is just this reality: to take ownership of one's actions and decisions in their relationship with God in which a person actively participates in prayer—both personal and communal—along with acts of charity for the good of their souls and for the Church. In Baptism, as we'll learn later on, the gift of the Holy Spirit enables us, St. Thomas Aquinas says, "to do those things which pertain to [one's] own salvation, forasmuch as he lives to himself." Confirmation, according to St. Thomas, goes further by enabling one to "receiv[e] [the] power to do those things which pertain to the spiritual combat with the enemies of the Faith. This is evident from the example of the apostles, who, before they received the fullness of the Holy Ghost, were in the 'upper room persevering in prayer' (Acts 1:13, 14)." At Pentecost, the apostles went from the infantile confines of the Upper Room into the world hostile to Christianity, but ripe for evangelization. The geopolitical landscape of the first century is still true today. The newly confirmed apostles were ready to spring into action to proclaim through their lips and their lives the faith they held dear to their hearts. This is also true for all those who are confirmed.

Confirmation strengthens one with the graces brought by the sacrament to grow in the fullness of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. These gifts are wisdom, understanding, knowledge, fortitude, fear of the Lord (holy reverence for God), counsel, and piety. These gifts are essential for a Christian to "be a true and active witness of Christ in the world, and to share in the Church's mission to spread the Gospel by example, words, and prayer" (Feingold, *Touched by Christ: The Sacramental Economy*, 361). *These gifts of the Holy Spirit enable one to possess knowledge, truly utilizing it for promoting what is good, beautiful, and true in the created world. Likewise, the gift of understanding endows one to "recognize truth and error in matters of faith, and to penetrate the truths in a habitual way through analogy with their human experience" (Feingold, 365).* Wisdom, which is something most of us intuitively desire to possess, enables those confirmed to judge and order their lives through the mystery of the Lord's Cross and the love of the Holy Trinity. In other words, wisdom sees the order of the world and creation through the prism of its relationship to God. Fortitude gives the Christian the courage and perseverance to authentically witness their faith and the truths of the Catholic Church in the face of opposition and personal discouragement. Fear of the Lord, which is reverential, not servile fear, orders one's will and actions in accordance to the love one has for God, along with God's love for them, without falling into sins of presumption. Counsel is an important gift of the Holy Spirit because it orientates one's wisdom, knowledge, and understanding by directing it in personal charity toward others, giving them guidance and discernment in their lives. This gift fulfills the prophetic office one receives at their baptism. Lastly, piety is a gift that reveres and recognizes God's sacred presence in the world, and what and whom he has blessed, as something altogether holy and set apart from what is common. This is especially true in reverencing God's Holy Name and His presence in the Holy Eucharist.

There is probably more I could write on the Sacrament of Confirmation; it is truly a beautiful sacrament of the Church that enables Christian men and women to give authentic witness and courage to their faith. Let's pray for those receiving this sacrament, whether they are in 8th grade or adults at the Easter vigil. Let's pray that they may grow in the gifts of the Holy Spirit to be a blessing to the Church and to those impacted by their lives.

OCIA LESSON: MORE ON THE SACRED LITURGY OF THE MASS

For the past fifty years the Church has given believers the opportunity to participate more fully in the Mass. Restoring the vernacular allows us to pray and sing in our native language. In the Mass believers offer ourselves--as the priest prays at the preparation of the gifts-- "that my sacrifice and yours be acceptable to God."

At the beginning of Mass we ask for mercy. The great Kyrie is prayed, sometimes in the ancient Greek. Recognizing that we are sinners, we seek conversion--the essential acknowledgement of our need for redemption. Then we praise our Savior in the majestic "Gloria". Then lectors proclaim the first two Scriptures and the congregation prays the Psalms in response. After the Gospel and homily we pray the Creed aloud.

Throughout the Mass the priest summons the congregation many times to reply to a call to enter the action. Most importantly at the beginning of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, we pray or sing the "Holy, Holy, Holy". Immediately after the Consecration we boldly acknowledge the presence of Jesus by saying or singing the Acclamation with joy and reverence. At the end of the Consecration prayers, the congregation affirms all the proceedings with the "Great Amen".

Then the people pray the "Our Father" followed by the Sign of Peace. Next we pray or sing the "Lamb of God" in preparation for Communion.

At the end of Mass we are commissioned and we agree to "go out and tell the Good News".

AS the Catholic Catechism says: The Liturgy is the work of the whole Christ, Head and Body. Our High Priest celebrates it unceasingly in the heavenly liturgy, with the holy Mother of God, the apostles, and all the saints and the multitude of those who have already entered the Kingdom. (CCC 1187)
