


The Rains Fell, The Floods Came, and Buffeted the House

As I sit down to write my bulletin article for this week I acknowledge we are receiving a lot of rain. When I celebrated Mass earlier in the week I could hear the torrential downpour hitting against the roof and window pane. It reminds me of a time at Mass when I was in the seminary and on one Sunday morning the priest celebrating Mass decided to start his homily with a joke—always a risking move because you never know if people in the pews are awake enough to laugh. This priest, as the rain was pouring down from outside, said, “I’m disappointed in our Scripture readings for today.” This, of course, caused everyone to gasp at such a statement. Then he continued, “Today’s readings should be about Noah’s Ark, because it’s been raining forty days and forty nights out there.” Surprisingly, it brought about a tremendous laughter from parishioners. It’s amazing that I don’t even remember the rest of this priest’s homily, but I will never forget this epic dad joke that primed the congregation for the rest of the priest’s message.

Although our recent accumulation of rain reminds me of this experience, I do think there is something providential in recalling the story of Noah and the flood. Its imagery and story serves as a great Old Testament backdrop to Jesus’ message about sin in the Gospel for this weekend. Let us consider the flood in Noah’s days: God inflicted a world-wide flood over the earth to vanquish the evil of people’s sinful behavior and lifestyle. The people in Noah’s days, outside of his household, were completely given into sin and vice. As a result, God cleared away those who gave themselves into sin and saved Noah’s household through the ark. The ark served Noah as God’s vessel, His divine grace, protecting and saving him, his family, and pairs of animals from the damning consequence of sin. Noah, in other words, interceded for his family to pass through the flood waters that engulfed and destroyed—at least temporarily—the ravages of sin and death. The story of the flood and Noah’s family is a beautiful Old Testament type foreshadowing the power and grace of Holy Baptism in saving humanity from sin, remitting original and all actual sin (personal sin), and bringing us into a covenantal love with the living God.

Now how does this story apply to the Gospel’s message on personal sin? I’m glad I asked that question for you. I think we can lean into Noah’s story a bit. Imagine being in a boat for over a month in the middle of the ocean. I’m not talking about being on a cruise ship; the ark you’re in will definitely make you at times, if not most, very seasick. Noah and his family quite literally were living with a constant storm and turbulent waters in which their suffering seemed to be an eternity. Noah and his family were, in other words, being stretched to trust in God and have faith that He would see them through the storm. They could have easily given into despair and hopelessness, which would have caused them to curse God and to fall into sin and wickedness. Instead, they persevered and were rewarded with a new life free from the harm, the slander, and maliciousness of the people who died in the flood. Similarly, we’re called to combat the temptation to sin by striving to grow through God’s grace in the virtues of hope, courage, and perseverance. These virtues are key to resist sin and temptation, no matter what storms we go through in life. A great way to conquer sin and temptation is by examining what in our life needs to be cut off from our time, attention, and focus in order not to fall into despair, selfishness, and cowardliness. Jesus says this much in the Gospel today, “If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life maimed than with two hands to go into Gehenna, into the unquenchable fire” (Mark 9:43). This is the difference between following the path of Noah and his family or devolving into the sinful populace who lost their lives due to their sin and wickedness. Jesus is not asking us to literally cut off members of our own body; however, He is asking us to cut off those things in our lives that cause each of us to sin. The virtues I mentioned above will protect us from falling into temptation no matter what storms or floods we encounter in life. With God’s grace we can do all things no matter if life seems to be raining on our parade!

We are one Body of Christ, when one of us is hurting, all of us feel the pain.


