

"My Lord and My God!"—An Easter Proclamation

One of my favorite artists, if not my favorite artist, is Michelangelo da Caravaggio who lived in Italy—principally in Milan and Rome—during the late 16th & early 17th century. He is best known from the town he originates from: Caravaggio. This early Baroque artist mastered the technique of chiaroscuro, which is the complementarity of light and darkness in paintings. Caravaggio's paintings are not landscape scenes of linear depth; instead, he over crowds the figures in his paintings with realism and humility of stature, with the drama of raw emotion. Caravaggio's art, as some art historians would say, rejects the classicism of the Renaissance and the altra-transcendent piety of the High Baroque period. He is, in other words, a unique genre unto himself in art history. One of Caravaggio's masterpieces that exemplifies the power, drama, and dynamism of Our Lord's Resurrection is *The Incredulity of Saint Thomas*:



In the Gospel of John, Jesus appears multiple times to a variety of people on Easter Sunday. The first time Jesus appeared to his disciples after the Resurrection Thomas was not present. Eight days later, Thomas was incredulous and unwilling to believe Jesus rose from the dead. He famously says, “Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hand in his side, I will not believe” (John 20:25). Our Lord that same day appears to his disciples again, with Thomas present, and utters the words, “Peace be with you.” This peace, this *shalom, is imparting to Jesus' disciples a deep, eternal peace of the soul. Afterward, Jesus says to Thomas, “Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side; do not be faithless, but believing”* (John 20:27). St. Thomas' famous words, which every person who deeply encounters Jesus Christ as the incarnate Son of God, fully man and fully God—resurrected from the dead in conquering eternal death wrought by sin—says emphatically, “*My Lord and my God!*” (John 20:28).

Caravaggio's *Incredulity of Saint Thomas* captures this biblical scene and the raw power of the Resurrection as a feast for the eyes. One cannot help reading The Gospel John, especially in all the Resurrection narratives, while reflecting on the visual beauty and depth of this painting, and not be moved emotionally by the phenomenon of Our Lord's Resurrection. This painting draws the eyes to St. Thomas' forehead, with the wrinkles and the weather-worn brow of this older disciple. St. Thomas looks like the weight of the world was on his shoulders due to the tragedy of the Cross. However, when Thomas encounters Jesus for the first time after Easter Sunday, Thomas is shocked beyond belief as he places his hands on Jesus' side marked by the spear. Saint Thomas didn't just believe because he saw and physically touched Jesus after the Resurrection; he believed because the physical proof gave evidence to all that Jesus said, taught, and lived each day while he was with His disciples. This is what St. Thomas needed to proclaim emphatically that Jesus Christ is God!

I get choked up each time I read and meditate on this Resurrection scene. Caravaggio's painting visually brings in the emotion that is personally experienced not only for myself, but for many others in their Catholic faith. Many people within the Church and outside of it struggle with believing in Jesus Christ and His relevance in their daily lives. On some level, many of us can relate to St. Thomas due to the wounds we carry. Yet, like St. Thomas, are we willing and desirous to allow Our Lord's Resurrection to conquer our fear, anxiety, anger, and depression? Carvaggio's painting shows Thomas at the moment of interior and eternal emancipation due to Jesus' Easter Resurrection. Our Resurrected Lord is present physically to us each day, if we can only see with our eyes and touch with our hands and lips the Presence of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

Blessed Easter to you all, with blessings and prayers for you and your family!

OCIA-THE ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION

WHEN DO WE CELEBRATE THE PASCHAL MYSTERY?

The high point of our faith—the Paschal Mystery—is celebrated at the Triduum and Easter Sunday. Easter is known as the “feast of feasts”.

The Paschal Mystery is the Passion, death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ by which he heals us from sin and enables us to become children of God. Holy Thursday (the institution of the Eucharist), Good Friday (Jesus' sacrificial suffering and death by crucifixion), and the Easter Vigil (Jesus' rising from the dead), are our holiest days.

Please attend the celebrations. Check the Bulletin for the scheduled services of the Triduum. Bring the family to experience the Paschal Mystery.


