

## **Reverential Fear and Joy—The Effects of Jesus' Divine Mercy**

Earlier this week during the Octave of Easter we read from the Gospel of Matthew a portion of the Resurrection story when Mary Magdalene and the other Mary encountered Jesus after seeing the empty tomb. These two women had a very striking experience, which is best described as “fearful yet overjoyed.” Fear and joy don’t seem to be two feelings one experiences at the same time; these emotions are usually opposite of each other. Usually, when we go through feelings of joy it drives out fear; likewise, when one is fearful the last thing one could say about themselves is they are joyful. How could it be that these two Marys experienced both fear and joy? Oh, and not just joy, but feeling “overjoyed.” The answer is best described as holy fear, or reverential fear. The women at the tomb leaving in exuberance at the personal encounter with the Risen Jesus experienced a deep reverence, wonder, and awe that produced pleasant shock and amazement. Seeing and talking with Jesus was uncanny and almost otherworldly. Such a profound effect on Mary Magdalene and the other Mary, along with other eyewitnesses of the Risen Lord, is a major result of the fruits of Jesus’ Resurrection.

The Holy Spirit’s work in providing the grace of reverential fear and joy didn’t simply happen to those privileged to encounter Jesus after the Resurrection. On this Divine Mercy Sunday, we should recall the words St. Faustina wrote when she had a vision of Jesus in her cell at the convent she lived in. After seeing the font of two rays coming from Jesus’ heart, St. Faustina said, “From the opening of [Jesus’] garment at the breast there came forth two large rays, one red and the other pale. In silence I gazed intently at the Lord; my soul was overwhelmed with fear, but also with great joy. After a while Jesus said to me, ‘paint an image according to the pattern you see, with the inscription: Jesus, I trust in You.’” St. Faustina’s personal encounter with Jesus produces the same effects as we read in the Resurrection account in Matthew’s Gospel. Our Risen Lord visits this Polish saint and reveals to her the font of His infinite Mercy, which is depicted in the rays coming from His Sacred Heart. St. Faustina’s reaction is both a gift and fruit of the Holy Spirit: holy fear and tremendous joy.

On this Divine Mercy Sunday, the image of Our Lord’s Divine Mercy is available to us. We can easily obtain the image and contemplate the depth of Jesus’ mercy and love for us, especially in our brokenness and sin. Undoubtedly, if we participate in the chapel of Divine Mercy, go to confession, and receive Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament during these next few days I will guarantee you that the experiences of reverence, awe, and joy will overwhelm your heart. It only takes a little effort, an openness to God’s grace, and the desire for divine love. That is how we can encounter the same Risen Lord as those two Marys did so humbly on Easter Sunday!

### **OCIA LESSON: WHERE ARE THE CATHOLIC CHURCH'S TEACHINGS FOUND?**

The Catholic Church's beliefs and practices have come from the apostles through Scripture and Tradition which are interpreted by the apostles' successors, the bishops. Scripture is the single collection of 73 books—inspired by God—revealing himself and his saving plan. Tradition is what was revealed by God and handed on to the apostles but not explicitly recorded in Scripture. The disciples taught before they wrote, and this oral teaching remained authoritative alongside written Scripture. Examples are the number of the sacraments and Mary's Assumption.

The Magisterium is the teaching office of the Church exercised by the Pope, the successor of Peter, and the bishops in union with him. Examples are the Creeds and the other doctrines of the twenty-one Ecumenical (Church) Councils since the time of the apostles.

The Second Vatican Council document reflects that Scripture, Tradition and the Magisterium are the sources of Church teaching and “so connected and associated that one of them cannot stand without the other.” (Dei Verbum, n. 10)


### Vocational Chalice
