Saint Louis, King of France—The Eucharist

In the years I worked at the St. Louis Art Museum, a familiar sight I drove up to each day coming into work was the “Saint Louis statue,” or more formally known as the “Apotheosis of Saint Louis.” It is an incredibly large statue on an equally large pedestal which sits on top of Art Hill. In my years of working at the Art Museum I can recall stories the old-time employees told me of how Washington University students used to climb the statue (I don’t know how they did it) and, as a prank or freshmen initiation rite, would remove the sword only to return it a few days later. Of course, this was in the days before cameras were installed on the Art Museum’s facade and the sword was welded to the statue. This story told to me could have been urban legend, but it made a symbol of our city very relatable and tangible to our life experiences. Personally, I remember the statue being one of the last images I saw of my old workplace on the morning of my last day at the Art Museum. It was a Tuesday morning, the sun was shining bright and the sun’s light glistened off the statue as I drove away one last time ready to embark on my journey into the seminary. It was as if Saint Louis himself held the sign of the Cross imparting his blessing upon me as I went forward on my own spiritual journey.

Since then I have had a fascination with the kingly man officially called “King Louis IX.” In fact, one of the thickest books on my bookcase at the rectory is by a French author, Jacques LeGoff, in his book titled, “Saint Louis.” Counting all the pages together, it is approximately 950 pages in length. Truly a remarkable biography for a medieval subject. Although I could sit here and give you a book review, I think it’s best to draw out from Saint Louis’ life a key insight relevant to what we’ve been reflecting on during these last few Sunday liturgies: the Holy Eucharist. For Saint Louis, the reception of the Holy Eucharist in Holy Communion is a natural consequence of the two pronged acceptance and participation in the sacraments of baptism and reconciliation.

Saint Louis could not fathom receiving Holy Communion without first receiving baptism. For us today we accept baptism as the first sacrament one receives in the life of the Church. While theologically we as a Church today do not differ from our 13th century ancestors in this regard, nevertheless, I think we miss out on the nuances baptism had for Saint Louis and 13th century Catholics. Saint Louis regarded baptism, including his own baptism, as a literal birth into the purity of being God’s child. The place of his baptism held as much significance, if not more, than the place of his physical birth. He even saw the importance of confession—and he frequently went to confession—as “recreating the conditions of purity in baptism.” Together baptism and reconciliation made it possible for one to receive the Eucharist in a state of sanctifying grace, which all the more made receiving Our Lord in the Eucharist much more special and significant.

Reading through the pages of Saint Louis’ life, you might be surprised that he did not receive Holy Communion as frequently as we do today. In the 13th century it was not customary for Catholics to receive Holy Communion each week for Mass. However, in Saint Louis’ case, this infrequency did not minimize the Eucharist’s importance. When Saint Louis did receive Holy Communion, he first participated in the sacrament of reconciliation and then intentionally received Our Lord in Blessed Sacrament by offering these Holy Communions for worshiping Christ, honoring our Lady, and venerating the saints. In other words, every time Saint Louis received Holy Communion he did so prayerfully and with the intention of offering worship to God and veneration to the saints in heaven.

This subtle lesson from Saint Louis’ life can be a means of inspiration for our own lives today. Certainly each of us are privileged to receive Holy Communion each Sunday, if not each day. Yet in the frequency of receiving Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament do we intentionally make it an act of prayer to God—offering Him worship and invoking the intercession of the saints in Christ? Do we bring our prayer intentions before the Lord as we approach the ciborium holding the precious Body and Blood of our Lord? Perhaps taking a further cue from Saint Louis, do we see the Holy Eucharist as a participation in the eternal banquet of heaven in which we are honored to participate in because of the purity of our own baptism? Do we make frequent use of the sacrament of reconciliation? Participating in the sacramental economy of the Church more fully will unlock tremendous graces and it will enrich our experience of Holy Communion. This is what Saint Louis teaches us in his own life.

Saint Louis, King of France—pray for us!




WHAT IS OCIA ?
