There is Nothing “Ordinary” about Remaining in the “Glow” of Epiphany

Here we are in the middle of January and we just completed the first week of Ordinary Time. This weekend marks the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time and maybe our knee-jerk reaction is to say to ourselves, rather sarcastically, “wow, this is special!” Let’s face it, most of us don’t bring in the brass band, with flutes and horns, for the choir when the priest is wearing green. However, most of us, including myself, sometimes miss out on the reality that the mystery of Epiphany—the wonder, amazement, and awe—of the manifestation of Jesus Christ’s divinity shining forth through his human nature is reflected in this Sunday’s “Ordinary Time” celebration. In other words, we are still called to experience the *glow and radiance of the Lord’s epiphany and this is reflected quite poignantly in this Sunday’s Gospel: The Wedding Feast of Cana. Sure, the Wedding Feast of Cana happened a long time ago, but its significance both biblically and historically are relevant for our relationship with Jesus Christ. In fact, this biblical scene tells us a lot about who Jesus is to Israel and to the Church, which we are all members of through the gift of our baptism.*

Journey through the beginning of John’s Gospel and you’ll see a lot of allusions to the creation story in Genesis. Even John’s Prologue indicates, “In the beginning was the Word...” similar to the beginning of God creating the heavens and the earth. In chapter 1 of John’s Gospel, Jesus is acting as the “creator-God” not in the order of nature, but in the order of grace. He separates the light from the darkness by ushering the beginning of sanctifying grace through the waters of baptism—His own baptism which will completely overcome the darkness of sin and bring about covenantal union between God and humanity under a New Covenant. Yes, this sounds like high-flung theology, but in reality it simply means that Jesus is beginning the process of not only redeeming man from sin, but bringing humanity into spousal union with Him. All of this in chapter 1 of John’s Gospel sets the stage for the Wedding Feast of Cana. It begins with Jesus and His disciples coming to the wedding feast, but, interestingly enough, Jesus’ mother is present too. The wedding party is all out of wine and Mary makes a simple request for Jesus to do something about it, even though she is aware of His divine power. Jesus directly says, “Woman, how does your concern affect me?” Ouch! Sounds like a harsh rebuke Jesus made to His mom. But that is not what is going on; in fact, Jesus is saying to Mary, “Woman, how does this concern affect you and me?” “What does this issue have to do with your relationship with me as my mom and I as your son?” Mary, simply put, made the request to Jesus to exercise His divine power to perform a miracle knowing that such a public display would completely change Mary’s relationship with Jesus.

This underscores the reason why Jesus called his mother, “woman.” He was alluding to Mary being Eve under the New Covenant, because, after all, Jesus was recreating humanity in the order of grace. But there is more than the creation motif going on in the Wedding Feast of Cana: Jesus, by calling and gathering His disciples together at a wedding feast, underscores what God did with Israel at Mt. Sinai. There in the Book of Exodus, God entered into a covenant with Israel and it was said that God feasted with Moses and an entourage of Israelites on the mountain top. Quite literally, the covenantal bond God made with Israel was spousal—He entered into a wedding feast with Israel at Mt. Sinai. Jesus, likewise, perfects and renews God’s covenant with Israel by entering into a wedding feast with those who will later be the beginning of the Church. Notice that the bride and bridegroom are not identified separately from Jesus, nor from Mary and the disciples. The main characters in this wedding feast scene are Jesus, Mary, and His disciples because the Wedding Feast of Cana mainly concerns them and the relationship that is created through this wedding feast. A new covenant begins at Cana and is sealed at the Last Supper and on Calvary.

Consequently, at face value what looks like an “ordinary” wedding celebration is actually an extraordinary, mysterious, and thoroughly dynamic relationship Jesus establishes with His Church. Granted, the Church has not openly started at this point in His public ministry, but Jesus is establishing through His spousal and covenantal union with His disciples the seedbed for the Church. What happens at the Wedding Feast of Cana affects the Church at Pentecost and beyond. It continues to affect the Church today, which means your lives and mine. What the Wedding Feast of Cana conveys, quite simply, is that our lives are relevant and meaningful because each of us is intimately connected—*covenanted—with God as our Lord, Savior, and eternal spouse!*

We share a blood relationship with God, with Jesus Christ, because of what happens at the Wedding Feast of Cana. After all, we participate in receiving at each Mass the Body and Blood of the Lord. We become what we eat when partaking of the Holy Eucharist and this unites us irrevocably to Christ. Let us continue to remain in the glow of the Lord’s epiphany as God, man, and covenant spouse!



CELEBRATING MARTIN LUTHER KING JR.

OCIA LESSON: THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY ORDERS

The apostles received the first call to the sacrament of Holy Orders from Jesus himself.(Mt 28:19-20) Holy Orders is the sacrament in which a baptized man receives the authority and ability to share in the work of leading the faithful to heaven, to preach and explain the Scripture and tradition, and to sanctify the faithful through the sacraments and priestly intercessions to God.

The three levels of ordained ministry are: Bishops who govern dioceses, can confer Holy Orders and normally confer Confirmation. Priests are co-workers of the bishops. They govern parishes, celebrate the Eucharist (Lk 22:19), forgive sins in Confession (Mt 18:18), confer Baptism and the Anointing of the Sick. They also preside at marriages. Deacons assist the priests, proclaim the Gospel and engage in works of charity and service. While the promise of lifelong celibacy is the normal condition for reception of Holy Orders, a permanent deacon may be married.

As the ordained minister provides the governance, the teaching, the sacraments, it is Christ himself who is present as Head of the Body (the Church), Shepherd of his flock, high priest of the redemptive sacrifice (the Mass). Thus the priest acts in *persona Christi capitatis*—in the person of Christ the Head.

Keeping this motto uppermost in the hearts of the faithful appropriately renders the love and respect for priests and prayer that one of their family be called to Holy Orders.
