

Liturgy is the Work of Christian Unity and Hope

This past Monday our country celebrated Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Dr. King was not only a civil rights leader, but he was an important voice for unity among all peoples, whether it be race, religion, or creed. Although MLK was honored on Monday, many of us were conscientious of it being Inauguration Day this year. I assume some of you were watching the Inauguration Day festivities leading up to President Trump's oath of office. I certainly was one of the thousands, if not millions, of people tuning in to the festivities. It was not because of any political reasons I watched the Inauguration festivities; my attraction to watching it was mostly for symbolic and historical reasons. I am a lover of American history and to see the "living" history of the "American experiment" of republican democracy take place with all its pomp and pageantry in the peaceful transfer of power is truly awe inspiring.

Interestingly, I found that while watching the Inauguration take place in the Capitol Rotunda it gave me an interesting perspective that I had not seen in previous Inaugurations. With the space being more intimate and the people being more up close and personable—yes, even to the TV viewer—there seemed to be a united country represented in the people gathered in the Rotunda. The festivities and ceremony surrounding this event, in the heart of American democracy, appeared to transcend political ideology, parties, and petty politics. For just one hour the public work and bipartisan efforts undertaken to showcase the beauty of the United States democratic system took precedence over egos and agendas. It is nothing short of secularized "liturgy" with allusions to God and our relationship and freedom endowed by our creator and also, in one prayer invocation, our redeemer.

This minute reflection on the Inauguration Day ceremony ties in nicely with how liturgy elevates us into unity with God and each other. Not only this but the liturgy also increases our hope for perfect unity with the Lord and the Church, which will be fully realized at Jesus' Second Coming. The first reading for our Sunday Masses this weekend is taken from Nehemiah 8. The historical context of this passage happens to be during the period after the Jewish exiles from Babylon are allowed to return to Judah. The Jews rebuilt the Temple and began to rebuild their lives in their old country, but it's a mere shadow from the glory they once experienced before the Babylonian captivity. The rebuilt Temple is a shack of a place compared to the beauty of Solomon's Temple; they are constantly reminded of the tragedy of what they lost. Understandably, the former exiles are hopeless and despondent. Yet, Ezra and Nehemiah encourage the people to return to worship God, principally in something akin to the "liturgy" of the law. By receiving God's law and the good news of the Lord's covenant fidelity proclaimed to them, the Jewish people, here in this passage, are to find joy in God and the blessings he has in store for them. In a sort of proto-Liturgy of the Word, Nehemiah is stating that the Jewish people are not to forget their problems or sadness, but to offer them to God in sacrifice and receive His covenant fidelity in return. This is what is meant by the "Lord must be your strength" toward the end of the passage.

This is why active participation and repeatedly going to Mass each week is incredibly important. Life is filled with constant struggles, distractions, discouragement, and petty grievances which often drive us away from God, from others—including the people who matter to us the most, and ourselves. Yet, despite the hot mess we might find ourselves embroiled in, or the destabilizing complacency of laziness or spiritual acedia that envelop our attitudes, the greatest medicine for our physical, moral, and spiritual health is the work of the Church's liturgical life. Showing up to Mass each Sunday is a start, but it takes active participation to truly feel the effects of the liturgy and how it leads each of us into greater unity among each other and, as a Church, to God. What is active participation? Prayer, praying with your whole heart! Actively listen to the Scriptures proclaimed at Holy Mass. If you don't understand what is being said, then the best solution is to prepare yourself with the readings before going to Mass. There are a number of reflections for the Sunday Scripture readings for Mass. Offer your entire life and what is currently going on in your life spiritually at the altar when the priest raises the bread and wine to be transformed into Jesus Himself. What you prayed for and offered in sacrifice is now God Himself and he is giving Himself to you! That reality there is more intimate than the greatest of romances!

It takes wisdom and common sense to know that everything that is meaningful in life takes work: marriage, family, building and sustaining a career, a household, and, yes, sporting activities. Why not put work into active participation in Holy Mass, in the Liturgy of the Hours, in your prayer? If each of us did this our liturgies would inevitably lead us to greater unity and we'd be brimming with Christian hope. This is something greater than what can be gleaned from Inauguration Day or a 4th of July barbecue.

Did you know that St. Therese got the title Little Flower by referring to herself as being one little flower in God's garden. The people who named our church considered it an honor to be one of the first churches in the world to be named for her. She was canonized in May of 1925 the year our parish was founded.

OCIA LESSON: THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE—A SUPERNATURAL VOCATION

Marriage is that sacrament by which a baptized man and woman are bound together by vows to an *exclusive life-long commitment* to one another and to accepting and raising children. In this sacrament God gives grace for the fulfillment of these duties.

Echoing St John Paul II, Bishop Robert Barron teaches that "authentic married love is caught up into divine love in such a way that the family functions as ...the image of the divine love at work in the world." And from St Paul, marriage is a "symbol of Christ's love for his church." The essential love of husband and wife passes "beyond eros (sensual desire) to self-giving love."

Why marry in church? "A couple should come before God and his people only when they are convinced that their marriage is not finally about them; that it is, in fact about God and about serving God's purposes." They see that they have been brought together by the divine love to be a radiant sign of that love to the world.


