Checkmate! Jesus' Chess Match of Mercy

Most people I assume love or hate to play a game of chess. Those who love it are enamored by the strategy and skill it takes to place their opponent in the trap of being “checkmated.” Others, particularly if you don’t like playing chess, balk at how long the game takes to play and the delay one’s opponent might take to move a pawn or a bishop on the board. If you’re one of those individuals who love and appreciate the game of chess, you will either love to utter the word, or dread hearing the word, “checkmate!” Once this word is said, it is obvious one’s king is caught in the trap. Whimsically, it reminds me of Admiral Ackbar in *Star Wars’ Return of the Jedi* when he announces the Empire’s counter-offensive, “It’s a trap!” Nobody wants to be caught in a trap—certainly not in *Star Wars* nor in a chess game.

This weekend the Church commemorates the 5th Sunday in Lent. Traditionally this Sunday is called Passiontide because we’re entering into the final lap of our Lenten journey before Holy Week. It is a significant time to consciously reflect and meditate on Our Lord’s approaching journey toward His paschal mystery. It is customary for statues and sacred art to be veiled during this weekend through Triduum. By being temporarily deprived of the beautiful works of art and statuary in many churches, the faithful are encouraged to soberly meditate on the Scriptures accompanying us on our spiritual walk with Jesus to His Cross. What better Gospel passage to meditate on this week than what the Church provides us for this Sunday. Here, in John 8:1-11, the Pharisees and scribes bring to Jesus a question, imploring Him to answer a very daunting conundrum: “Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of adultery. Now in the law, Moses commanded us to stone such women. So what do you say?” Interestingly, the Pharisees and scribes tell Jesus this woman was caught in the act of adultery. However, why is she being placed on trial before Jesus and not the man as well? Mosaic law would hold both lethally accountable for the act of adultery. It is possible that the woman supposedly caught in adultery was a hired actor in order to fictitiously set Jesus up for a trap. But what is the trap? How are the Pharisees and scribes trying to entrap Jesus with an answer to their question placed before him? It would be good to set up the context for why they are asking the question to Jesus and the scene where this is taking place.

It appears that Jesus could only answer “yes” or “no” to executing the woman due to her supposed grievous sin. If Jesus answered “yes” to executing the woman because the Mosaic law prescribed such a punishment, the Pharisees and scribes could go directly to the Roman officials and claim that Jesus is guilty of an act of sedition because only the Roman empire had the right to enforce the death penalty. This would surely lead to Jesus being executed by the Roman authorities. After all, this scene took place in the Temple precinct and the Roman empire built a towering fortress adjacent to the Temple, in which they were hawk-eyeing everyone around the area. It would have been easy to arrest Jesus on the spot! However, if Jesus would have answered “no” to executing the woman, the Pharisees and scribes would have gone to pious Jews and had reason to discredit Him as cherry-picking what He likes, or finds more advantageous, about the Mosaic law. This would cause Jesus’ reputation for piety and obedience to be defamed. Consequently, it seems that Jesus is set up for a trap. Checkmate! It appears that Jesus has no way out. But Our Lord has outwitted these foxes!

Perhaps before Jesus stood up straight to answer the Pharisees’ persistent question, He was writing on the ground the sins of those seeking to trap Him. As Jesus stood up, He exclaimed, “Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.” It was a brilliant response to their question—knowing full well their covert trap. Jesus turned the tables on the Pharisees and scribes, reversing the fortunes of this chess match. Jesus knew the Pharisees and scribes thought of themselves as removed from sin; to admit publicly they are sinners is to identify with those who publicly were regarded as sinners. This was simply impossible to do given their pride, self-righteousness, and self-absorption. However, if they too sought to execute the woman, they would incur the same punishment from the Roman authorities as they tried to do against Jesus: it would be regarded as an act of sedition. Realizing they had been outwitted by Jesus in their dialogue with Him, they left one-by-one until Jesus and the woman were left alone. Checkmate on the Pharisees and scribes; Our Lord has won this chess match.

Yet, the Gospel this weekend isn’t simply about showing how smart Jesus exercised His wit and wisdom. In fact, the chess match with the Pharisees and scribes was to underscore His mercy, especially toward the woman in this biblical scene. All of us can relate to the woman on one level or another due to our own sinful behavior. Regardless of whether the woman committed adultery or if she was a paid actor in this attempted trap, Our Lord implores her to seek forgiveness and to be mercifully set free from the darkness and isolation of her sin. The woman’s accusers are gone; Jesus has the power, and demonstrated the power, to drive out her accusers who only wanted to inflict pain, suffering, and death. Finally alone with Jesus, the woman is set free and has a new lease on life. We too have, and can, receive the benefits of Jesus’ mercy and love. He can clear away the greatest accuser of them all—Satan and his dominion—by driving them away like chess pieces plucked from the chess board of life!

ARCHDIOCESAN LENTEN REGULATIONS

The Church has always helped us fulfill these words of Jesus by prescribing very definite penance for all Catholics, so that we too might have Eternal life. Accordingly, the Pope and the American Bishops have outlined obligatory fast and abstinence as follows:

Ash Wednesday (Wednesday March 5th, 2025) and Good Friday (April 18th, 2025) are days of *abstinence (refraining from meat)* for all Catholics *from the age of 14 onwards*. On these two days, *fast*, as well as *abstinence*, is also obligatory for those *from the ages of 18-59*. Abstinence means refraining from meat. Fast means one full meal a day, with two smaller meals and nothing between meals (liquids are permitted). No Catholic will lightly excuse himself or herself from this obligation.

All Fridays in Lent are days of *abstinence* from meat. Here again Catholics will not hold themselves lightly excused, but if there is a serious health problem, this obligation would not apply.
