Jesus Christ is Our Triumph and Our King

Perhaps some of us remember where we were when we heard the news that the Cathedral of Notre Dame caught on fire. If you care to have your memory jogged, it happened on April 15, 2019 and it caught on fire during Holy Week. I remember exactly where I was when I heard the news: it was my day off and I just got done with an ice skating session. When I sat in my car I checked my phone and all of a sudden the news broke out that Notre Dame Cathedral is on fire! I saw a video of the fire and the whole church seemed to be engulfed in flames. To make matters worse, I saw the spire collapse into the nave of the church. My heart and stomach nearly burst with anguish. The Cathedral of Notre Dame has a special place in my heart. Before I returned to practicing my Catholic faith as a young adult, I took a trip to visit a friend living in Geneva, Switzerland. One of the places I visited during my two week stay was Paris and, of course, I had to see the Notre Dame Cathedral. During my visit to this awesome and spectacular cathedral church, I did not expect to be moved by the Holy Spirit. I felt the desire to go to confession for the first time in years. However, I held off going to confession, but walking into Notre Dame I firmly believe, was the beginning of the Lord planting the seed to my conversion back to practicing the Catholic faith. It all happened at this illustrious Cathedral to Our Lady.

In the aftermath of the fire I heard of some heroic stories of Parisians walking the streets in religious procession and praying the Rosary. Likewise, I heard of one of the priests going into the church as it was ablaze to retrieve the Blessed Sacrament and to save the reported “Crown of Thorns” Jesus wore on the Cross. And when the roof caved in and the nave was left to charred wood and ashes from what toppled from above, shining brightly the next day was the golden cross inside the decimated cathedral. That Cross was the symbol of a new beginning for the Notre Dame Cathedral; faith, determination, and fortitude would transform this sacred space to its former glory. Immediately, people from all over the world poured in money to save Our Lady’s Cathedral church. Notre Dame Cathedral wasn’t just a symbol of France or Paris: it is an icon of sanctity in a world riddled with sin and darkness. That sacred building has survived the dark days of the French Revolution and World War II, with the fire being the most recent devastation it had to endure. Notre Dame Cathedral is a beautiful motif of the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ, especially as we begin to celebrate Christ, the King of the Universe this weekend.

Notre Dame Cathedral is set to reopen on December 7th this year. Five years after the destruction that set it on fire, the restored bells for the towers are now in place and ringing across the Parisian streets. The walls and interior paintings are all meticulously restored, making the interior of the Cathedral brighter, more colorful, and more pristine than it has been in centuries. New life has been brought to Notre Dame Cathedral and everything restored or replaced as it looked before the fire in 2019. One could say this is a sacramental sign of the Resurrection itself! It’s not only a triumph of ingenuity; it’s a triumph of faith in God. I think Notre Dame is a microcosm of Jesus’ triumph over the ugliness of sin, death, and destruction. Just as this cathedral underwent a devastating fire, among other human social and economic tragedies in its history, it comes out as triumphant over the forces of the world—whether it be Maximillien Robespierre during the French Revolution, Napoleon Bonaparte, or Adolf Hitler—Notre Dame symbolizes the sanctuary, the throne room, of Jesus Christ as Lord and King. What disappointments, sufferings, and tragedies have you and I endured in our lives? Are you walking through a spiritual and emotional dark valley? If a sacred building could endure and triumph over all these things in its nearly 900 year existence, just imagine what Christ our King can do for you through the Holy Spirit. Notre Dame is a special place; but you and I are more valuable than the Notre Dame Cathedral. After all, St. Paul says it best, “Do you not know you’re a Temple of the Holy Spirit?” Jesus Christ, you are our triumph and our sovereign king!

OCIA LESSON –WHY BELONG TO A PARISH?

The Catholic Catechism writes: “A parish is a definite community of the Christian faithful established on a stable basis within a particular church (diocese or archdiocese); the pastoral care is entrusted to a pastor as its own shepherd...It is a place where all the faithful can be gathered together for the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist.”

The parish brings the Christian people into its dynamic liturgical life following the entire Church year—from Advent to the feast of Christ the King. It teaches Christ’s saving doctrines and practices charity in good works and brotherly love. A parish is a microcosm of the universal church.

In the fourth century St. John Chrysostom wrote: “You cannot pray at home as a church, where there is a great multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayer of the priests.”
