

## The Mystique of Time: Reflections on the End Times

Arguably the most precious commodity each of us possess, if we can call it either a commodity or possession, is the use of our “time” toward something or someone. The use of “our time” for projects, work, kids’ sports games, worship in church and in private, family activities, and rest are all important ways to budget our time. It could be argued that people are more willing to open up their wallet or checkbook to projects, events, and people than they would their calendar. Time, in other words, is more valuable and precious than the surplus wealth in our bank account. This is not an indictment on what is more valuable, but it is descriptive of what each of us recognizes is more important in our lives. We can reasonably regain expenses in our bank account through savings; it is never possible to regain time spent throughout the day or week, especially if we feel our time was wasted or it could have been spent to better use. In short, our money can always outlast our lives; time limits our ability to live, move, and have well-being.

While we intuitively know time is the greatest natural commodity or resource at our disposal, it also has a lot to say about our limitations and our mortality. Recently, I have come to contemplate time in a real way. In the parish rectory where I live there are two grandfather clocks. For anyone who has a grandfather clock in your house, you know when the clock stops working. The bells and chimes stop going off at the appropriate time and your ear doesn’t pick up the sound coming from the hands and pendulum moving. The silence becomes unsettling. However, for a grandfather clock to work properly it needs us to be immersed in winding the weights and making sure the clock is correct. Done correctly, human interaction and the workings of the grandfather clock become infused in the minute-to-minute ticking of time. Yet, by having two clocks I too notice that one moves faster than the other. Exasperated, I readily turn the faster one back, only to see it again moving faster than the other clock. Already immersed in the workings of the grandfather clocks, I realized something important about time: no matter how much I try to control time, it eludes my grasp and I have to settle for what I can reasonably do and make the most out of it. As the bells, chimes, and ticks fill my ears and brain with reminders of time spent, it also indicates my time is limited in the days, months, years—even the entirety of my life here on earth. It is amazing what a grandfather clock can teach me not only about time, but about the end times which we encounter in our Gospel this weekend.

In our Gospel this Sunday, Jesus teaches us and His disciples about the end times. The end times actually has a double meaning in the context of the Gospel passage. Certainly the end times in both senses describe cosmic phenomena accompanying the Lord’s glorification under an old order destroyed and a “new heavens and a new earth.” Yet, Jesus oddly states, “this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place.” What could Jesus mean about the end times in this context? This is where the double meaning of the end times comes into play. Certainly “a world” ended for many Jews in Israel in AD 70 when the Roman Empire destroyed Jerusalem and Herod’s Temple. In ancient Israel the Temple was a microcosm of the universe, with the Temple being the center of it. Likewise, the Temple’s interior was adorned with creation motifs to symbolically represent the Garden of Eden. The Jewish historian, Josephus, spoke about cosmic phenomena occurring before Jerusalem’s destruction. For Christians, this was the end of “a world” and the beginning of a “new Creation.” The new Creation—the Temple now being Christ’s Resurrection and His mystical body, the Church. But it is also a prophetic utterance of the “end of the world,” in which Christ will come definitively in His glory to judge all of humanity. Those who are prepared, like the Christians in AD 70, will be caught up in God’s glory, in a new creation of self-gift and divine charity. Those who are not prepared, who live their lives in self-centeredness and an absence of God in their lives, will choose hell over heaven. Heaven, for these individuals, would be unbearable and more tortuous than the pains of hell.

Time has a lot to do with our current lives and our eternal destination. While the grandfather clock ticks, chimes, and the bell tolls, are we aware that time is of the essence to prepare for works of charity and our meeting with the Lord? Let us make good use of our time.

### OCIA LESSON: WHY DO CATHOLICS MAKE THE SIGN OF THE CROSS?

Pope Francis says that each time that a Catholic makes the sign of the cross, it is a reminder that God—one God, three persons— is a communion of love. This simple gesture reminds us of the Trinity—a central mystery of our faith. Pope Francis also notes: “By tracing the cross on our body, we remind ourselves how much God loved us, to the point of giving his life for us; and we repeat to ourselves that his love envelopes us completely, from top to bottom, from left to right, like an embrace that never abandons us.”

The tradition of making the sign of the cross dates back to the apostles. St. Basil (329-379) wrote that the Apostles “taught us to mark with the sign of the cross those who put their hope in the Lord.”
