

Restoring the Ten Lost Tribes of Israel: Reflection on Our First Reading

Most people when they read, or listen, to the Book of Jeremiah are familiar with the opening chapter. The beginning of the book has God speak to a young Jeremiah about his prophetic vocation. The Lord tells him, “Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you, a prophet to the nations I appointed you” (Jer. 1:5). It’s a verse that is often utilized as Scriptural support for the sanctity of human life, especially the unborn, and our vocational capacity to be called by God to follow a certain way of life. For Jeremiah, being dedicated a prophet largely to the southern Kingdom of Judah and Jerusalem was an incredibly difficult vocation. The Lord told Jeremiah that his prophetic vocation to preach repentance to a city-state was going to be met with obstinacy and rejection. The princes, priests, and kings of Judah would ignore Jeremiah at best and, at worst, attempt to kill him. Yet, God made Jeremiah as tough as iron and gave him the courage and determination to preach the message of repentance Jerusalem needed to hear but went unheeded. God was not calling Jeremiah to a life of prophetic success; he did not enjoy the luxury of the court prophet like Nathan or Gad during King David’s reign. Instead, Jeremiah’s vocation was to be a visible sign of his faithfulness to God’s call and to suffer, if necessary, for the Lord’s covenant fidelity to His people. Added on to this suffering was Jeremiah witnessing the destruction of Jerusalem during the Babylonian captivity and being forced by other Judans into exile in Egypt, where he evidently met his own doom. In short, the Book of Jeremiah is not a happy story.

Although Jeremiah is a Scriptural book that is equivalent to a Greek tragedy, toward the end of the book there is a notable prophecy of hope. In Jeremiah 31:7-9 we see the prophet proclaiming something striking and bold about what God will do for *Israel!* *This is significant because Jeremiah is prophesying that God will bring back the remnant of Israel, Ephraim, and gather them to the people of the southern kingdom. In Jeremiah's time this was unthinkable, unimaginable, and hard to believe. The northern kingdom, with Ephraim being the wealthiest of the ten tribes of the northern kingdom, was conquered by the Assyrians some 150 years before the Babylonian captivity of the south. Israel, the northern kingdom, was a distant memory and the people there were all but lost to the pagan nations who overcame them. Yet, Jeremiah's words of consolation and hope came true when Jesus came onto the picture in salvation history. This is evident in his preaching, healing, and ultimately His Cross, death, and Resurrection when he began to unite Samaria with the Gospel and, ultimately, with the Church's missionary efforts. Under the Church, the new Israel, Jesus brought Samaritans and Jews together effectively uniting both northern and southern kingdoms of Israel. The Lord brought new life out of something that looked lost, hopeless, and what seemed like a distant memory.*

I think it's significant to reflect on Jeremiah's story, his message, and the fulfillment of restoration God provided through his prophecy. This is particularly poignant for our parish here at Little Flower. Many of us might feel tempted to despair, to be obstinate, in our conviction that things will never improve in the parish. I admit there is a lot of hurt, pain, and grief over losing the school and questioning whether or not we'll have an Early Childhood Center. Also, Mass attendance looks uninspiring to many who come on Sundays. However, the future of this parish and its revival depends on each of us, from pastor to parishioner, on how much we are willing to invest our stewardship in the parish. It is simply not enough to rely on a few active parishioners to do the work of improving things and creating programs that might peak the interests of other parishioners. We all need to contribute to building the parish and put our talents, time, and money into things we truly want to happen here at Little Flower. I am asking for more than just ideas; I want each of you to contribute to something that will build hope and vibrancy in the parish. What are you willing to invest your stewardship in? Just as the Lord brought hope and fulfillment through what seemed like a lost cause, so too the Holy Spirit can do some amazing things for Little Flower parish. Are we willing and desirous to work together in the unity of the Holy Spirit? I'm ready for it!

OCIA LESSON

Is the meaning of the Cross an enigma?

To some, the crucifixion represents a means to appease an angry God for humanity's sinfulness and waywardness. However, the opposite happened! Out of love, "God sent his only Son, that all who believe in him might have eternal life." (Jn 3:16) In this way God allows a divine solidarity with the lost, and the compassionate sacrifice of the Son is of infinite pleasure to the Father. Thus, the Cross symbolizes God's benevolent love for humanity. In the Gospel Jesus challenges us to "take up your cross" in the same self-forgetting way-- with love. In summary, the Cross is the template of the Christian life.





Dear Little Flower parish families,

Since arriving at Little Flower parish this summer, I have worked to understand what makes this parish unique and how best to proceed. Unfortunately, there has been considerable disagreement about what is next for Little Flower, and I have spent significant time speaking with parishioners and learning more about our community. It occurs to me that there is often a disconnect between folks in the pews on Sunday and the direction that our parish is headed. And many times, the feedback or priorities from the parish council have not aligned with the experience of many parishioners. There is no one to blame for this, and I believe that everyone, including the parish council, has the best interests of the parish at heart.

Because of that disconnect, I would like to develop a wider process of consultation that includes more voices from those in the pews. For this reason, I have made the difficult decision to dissolve the parish council and rely on feedback from a broader cross section of parishioners through regular communication and surveys of our families to determine the best path forward. We will explore as a parish community what kind of consultative bodies could be formed in the future (e.g. a reconfigured pastoral council or some other entity.) Please note that this decision will not impact the parish finance council, whose work will continue. To be perfectly clear, this is not intended as a judgment or indictment of the service of our parish council. I am eternally grateful for each member of our parish council and their service to our church. However, I firmly believe we must broaden the sphere of influence in our parish and gather feedback from a more diverse group. To this end, I have included a link to a survey below for Little Flower parish families. I hope you will take the time to respond to these questions thoughtfully, and I look forward to reviewing your responses and charting a path forward.
