

The History of "Kingshighway"—A Spiritual Reflection

Many people who grew up in St. Louis knows a thing or two about the “Gateway to the West.” If you were to talk to many St. Louisans, you would get a short, or long, history lesson about the city in general or, perhaps, their own neighborhood. I too love history and, particularly, St. Louis history. Recently, I came across a piece of St. Louis history that fascinates me: the history of Kingshighway Boulevard. Now, this might seem a bit odd to be attracted to the history of a road, but roads, and specifically this road, tells us a lot about the goals and dreams of St. Louis at the turn of the twentieth century. Likewise, the history of Kingshighway can help us appreciate the image of the “royal roads” alluded to in our Scripture readings for the 2nd Sunday of Advent and how they lead to a life of ease and prosperity, especially in light of our eternal destination: God’s heavenly Kingdom.

The beginning of Kingshighway in St. Louis is debated among local historians. Even the origins of its name “Kingshighway” is undoubtedly derived from “King’s Highway,” but we’re not sure if it refers to the French king or Spanish king at the time when St. Louis switched hands between the French and the Spanish. Some consider Kingshighway to be originally a native American trail because the original “Kingshighway”—St. Charles Rock Road—connected the native Americans to a portage on the Missouri River. However, the “Kingshighway” we know today probably was named as such because it connected the King’s sovereign land with the outlining lands used for farming. Eventually, this road served as a major artery of the city running north and south on an 18 mile span, beginning north at Bellefontaine and Calvary Cemeteries and ending south at Gravois Boulevard near Carondelet Park. By the time the 1904 World’s Fair rolled around, city planners had the ambition of seeing Kingshighway as the “Champs-Elysées of the West.” Since the road stretched across the city, incorporating two cemeteries and four major parks (e.g., O’Fallon Park, Forest Park, Tower Grove Park, and Carondelet Park), city planners wanted decorative street lights, landscaping, and beautiful buildings along the 18 mile road. Undoubtedly, Kingshighway was destined to be the parade route celebrating St. Louis, the cutting edge of urban life, economic growth, and industrial development. Truly, the namesake “Kingshighway” would be fitting for a “road to prosperity.”

Unfortunately, Kingshighway never lived up to its ambitious destiny for a multitude of reasons. Yet, its namesake does say something about its continuing significance, especially in light of our Scripture readings for this weekend. If one were to take a bike ride for those 18 miles of road, you would come across a variety of people, neighborhoods, businesses, hospitals, parks, and residents centers from various economic conditions. In sum, you would experience a wider range of the city of St. Louis than you would on most city roads. Kingshighway would give you a clue into both growth and development together with building dilapidation. In short, Kingshighway would give you an honest assessment of the neighborhoods around you, but with a flicker, and glimmer of hope for potential urban development.

This, I believe, is what our Scripture readings are about for this 2nd Sunday in Advent. When the Book of Baruch and the quote from Isaiah from the Gospel this weekend speak about “valleys being filled and mountains and hills made low” this is descriptive of kings in antiquity making royal highways so they can easily traverse their kingdom. Prophetically, both Baruch and St. John the Baptist, by quoting Isaiah, is highlighting that despite present conditions of oppression, pain, and human suffering there will be a time soon when people who are lost and forgotten will travel the royal highway leading to prosperity, peace, joy, and above all love. Prosperity and growth will, and does, culminate in Jesus Christ and His Church—to the degree that the Church reaches her perfection and beauty in His grace—by providing a new exodus into the promised land of Christ’s Kingdom.

Each of us may be facing challenges in our lives today. I don’t know what those are for each of you specifically, but God does know. Not only does He know it, but He is calling you and I to travel the royal highway with Him to encounter and receive His peace and prosperity—a prosperity that will have its full realization in the world to come. The royal road, the “Kingshighway,” God is calling us to travel may be a mixed bag of consolations and desolations; however, while the road may be a little bumpy it’s a lot better than the rough terrain without Him. God’s highway, the true “King’s Highway,” is filled with hope and future of brightness. Perhaps the next time you drive on Kingshighway, think about the royal road you are traveling in your journey of faith.
