

Don't Forget! The Psalms are Holy Scripture!

In my last year of seminary, my classmates and I took a fall semester class called, "Psalms and Wisdom Literature." It was taught by a Benedictine monk, Fr. Lawrence Kriegshauser. Father Kriegshauser loved the psalms and took particular interest in teaching this class. He wanted to desperately pass on to his young students the love for God's word in the psalter, which conveys, in poetic and literary imagery, the psalmists' experiences of God's majesty, power, goodness, love, and mercy. Likewise, the psalmists went through crushing pain, abandonment, sin, shame, and humiliation. The psalter in its decisive four books, as Fr. Kriegshauser so emphatically puts it, describes extensively the triumphs and tragedies of human experience, God's place in these experiences, and ultimate trust in the Lord's covenant love. While I learned a lot about the psalms from Fr. Kriegshauser's love for the psalter, I never forgot what he told the class, "When you guys preach your homilies, never forget the psalms are Sacred Scripture. They are God's holy word as much as the Old Testament and the Gospels."

Although I can't promise you I'll be preaching on the psalms this weekend, I do think it's important to reflect upon this Sunday's responsorial psalm. Psalm 33 is a cheerful psalm in Book I of the Psalter. This is unique because a lot of psalms in Book I are cries of lament. Psalm 33 is positioned to look at God's merciful love and the psalmist's song of hope in the context of experiencing lament, sadness, and grief. The response in the responsorial psalm sums up the psalm's words in the lectionary for this Sunday, "Lord, let your mercy be on us, as we place our trust in you." It's important to focus on the word "mercy" in this refrain; its meaning describes much of what the psalmist expresses in this unique psalm. The meaning of "mercy" in Scripture, and particularly Psalm 33, comes from the Hebrew word *hesed*, which translates literally as "covenant love." God's *hesed* is beautifully depicted in the Old Testament in the Book of Exodus and in the Book of Deuteronomy. First, in the Book of Exodus God makes a covenant with Israel vowing to be their God, making Israel His own people and He symbolically enters into a blood relationship with His people at Mt. Sinai. Similarly, in the Book of Deuteronomy, God renews His covenant with Israel after the golden calf incident by inviting the next generation of Israelites to enter into covenantal fidelity to Him that their parents failed to uphold. In exchange, God will make Israel particularly His own people and He will bless them with a land filled with "milk and honey." Furthermore, in the New Testament, Jesus as God renews His covenant love at the Last Supper and on the Cross by literally entering into blood relations with the New Israel—the Church. In all the other Scriptural references and allusions to *hesed*, God literally vows Himself to His people and never breaks His fidelity and union with them.

It is significant to reflect upon the Lord's *hesed*, His "mercy," as a reality and truth that God literally vows to make with His people—especially those of His Church and all the baptized. When each of us go through life thinking, maybe wondering, if God has abandoned me we can take courage and comfort in the psalms. Yet, despite the horror the psalmists experienced in many psalms in the psalter, the inspired words in the psalms always point us to God's covenant fidelity and love for his people, for each of us! I encourage you to pray the psalms in your time of prayer. I am privileged to pray the psalms each day in my daily prayers for the Liturgy of the Hours. The last stanza for our responsorial psalm this Sunday captivates the attitude we should have toward God's love for us and the importance of reciting this psalm often: "Our soul waits for the Lord, who is our help and our shield. May your kindness, O'Lord, be upon us who have put our hope in you."

If you held a mirror up to your life, would it reflect God's love and mercy? If you are struggling with this, try changing your attitude from "I want more" to "thank you God for everything you have given me, I have enough to share". This change in perspective will bring you joy through service to others. Pray daily to become less self-centered and to become more God-centered.
